To Whom It May Concern:

RE: 10-164 IRRC #2186 Drug and Alcohol Prevention and Intervention Activities

We are writing to provide comment on the final form regulations submitted by the Department of Health, to repeal the standards for approval of drug and alcohol prevention and intervention activities, 10-164 IRRC #2186.

Our association concerns, which were stated in a letter written May 15, 2001 to the Department of Health, have still not been addressed. In that letter, which is attached here, we stated that there should be no elimination of the current prevention regulations until an alternative process has been definitively established. There has been no indication that any of the recommendations presented by a group of stakeholders, who worked on an alternative process for two years, will be considered.

We believe that taxpayer funds would be placed at risk for ineffective use if no alternative process is established to certify or approve those programs that wish to participate in the delivery of prevention services. By eliminating standards without any alternative to replace them, it appears that we are devaluing prevention and the need for such services.

Finally, if the approval of such prevention and intervention programs will be managed through contracts with the Single County Authorities, as the Department of Health's explanations indicate, there will be costs involved to local government. We disagree with the statement that there would be "no measurable fiscal impact on the Commonwealth, local government, the private sector, or the general public."

I am writing on behalf of the Pennsylvania Association of County Drug and Alcohol Administrators (PACDAA) to oppose the deletion of existing prevention regulations and their oversight by the PA Department of Health. Division of Drug and Alcohol Licensure as published in the PA Bulletin, Doc. No. 01-679. While we agree that the existing regulations do not reflect current drug and alcohol prevention practice in Pennsylvania, we believe the recission is being done prematurely. As a result drug and alcohol prevention services, and the significant public dollars used to fund, will be at great risk.

A large amount of state, federal, and local public funding supports drug and alcohol prevention services throughout the state. These services touch on most segments of our communities. Therefore it is essential that we insure a baseline standard is met. By eliminating standards, without any alternative to replace them, it appears that we are devaluing prevention and the need for these services.

There has been a great deal of work done on an alternative by many stakeholders. However, there has yet to be a finished product distributed that has had any, much less adequate, time for comment from affected parties. There should be no elimination of the current prevention regulations until an alternative, which has been commented on by affected parties, has been definitively established.

Finally, adequate financial resources for implementation must accompany whatever alternative is established. The transfer of this responsibility from licensing to another entity results in a shift in costs that must be addressed. The Fiscal Impact note of the Proposed Rulemaking states that there would be "no measurable fiscal impact on the Commonwealth, local government, the private sector, or the general public. We strongly disagree with this statement.

Whatever alternative is established will require oversight. If this occurs via SCA contracts, it will require new staff at the County level. If it occurs via an independent certification body it will require funding to the selected body from the state, a new fee from prevention providers, or both. As many prevention organizations are grass-root, non-profits the need to pay this fee may also have the unintended effect of eliminating effective resources. If no alternative is established then large amounts of taxpayer funds are put at risk for ineffective use.

Dear John:

I am writing to oppose the proposed final form regulations No. 10-164 containing the recission of the existing prevention regulations and their oversight by the PA Department of Health and Division of Drug and Alcohol Licensure. Concerns raised at the time the regulations were proposed have not been addressed. I have attached my initial letter.

To date no alternative to these regulations has been established. Although the letter from the Secretary accompanying these regulations states that "viable, nonregulatory alternatives exist to monitor prevention services", these alternatives have not been communicated or provided to stakeholders for input.

While a group of stakeholders met to work with the Department on an alternative, this was two (2) years ago and there has never been a final product provided to stakeholders for comment. Additionally, when the workgroup ended there were several substantive issues that had still not been addressed. I am very concerned that existing regulations would be eliminated without a viable replacement that has been even minimally shared with stakeholders for comment.

I also must take issue with the Department's position that there will be no costs associated with this action. Millions of public dollars are expended on prevention services in the Commonwealth. Given the level of funding and importance of these services it would be irresponsible and unlikely for all standards and oversight to be eliminated. Therefore, assuming that there will, or should, be some alternative that replaces the Licensing oversight there will continue to be costs involved. The reality is that these costs will just be shifted to another entity.

The Department also states that "approximately 156 approved prevention facilities will no longer be required to incur expenses associated with complying with regulatory standards". Again, this appears inaccurate. Compliance with whatever alternative is established to the prevention regulations will have associated costs for providers. Unfortunately, since the alternative that will be used has not been provided to stakeholders for comment there is no way of knowing if the cost would be more or less than compliance with current standards.

As I stated in my initial letter, I do not disagree with the need to make the oversight of alcohol, tobacco, and other drug prevention services more responsive to the current practice. However, to eliminate the current system without a replacement does not seem responsible. To exacerbate this concern, the existing system is being eliminated with only a vague promise that an alternative exists. Without the provision of a concrete plan to stakeholders who can provide input on the viability and impact of the alternative, from both a programmatic and fiscal perspective, a change does not seem prudent.

Dear John:

I am writing to oppose the proposed deletion of existing prevention regulations and their oversight by the PA Department of Health, Division of Drug and Alcohol Licensure as published in the PA Bulletin, Doc. No. 01-679. I agree that the current regulations are not relevant to current drug and alcohol prevention practice in Pennsylvania. However, to delete these regulations without an alternative that has had stakeholder input in the final product is premature. If the regulations are deleted at this time, we place drug and alcohol prevention services and the significant public dollars used to fund them at great risk.

A large amount of public funding supports drug and alcohol prevention services throughout the state. Therefore, it is essential that we insure a baseline standard is met. These services touch on most segments of our communities. By eliminating standards, without any alternative to replace them, we devalue prevention and the need for these services.

There should be no elimination of the current prevention regulations until an alternative, which has been commented on by affected parties, has been definitively established. There has been a great deal of work done on an alternative by many stakeholders. However, there has yet to be a finished product distributed that has had any, much less adequate time for comment from affected parties.

The Fiscal Impact note of the Proposed Rulemaking states that there would be "no measurable fiscal impact on the Commonwealth, local government, the private sector, or the general public". The Cost and Paperwork Estimate states "There will be neither additional costs nor additional paperwork to the Commonwealth, local governments or the private sector resulting from the deletion of these regulations". I strongly disagree with these statements.

Whatever alternative is established will require oversight which is a new responsibility for someone. If this occurs via SCA contracts, it will require new staff at the County level. If it occurs via an independent certification body, it will require funding to the selected body from the state, and a new fee from prevention providers, or both. As many prevention organizations are grass-root, non-profits, the need to pay this fee may also have the unintended effect of eliminating effective resources. If no alternative is established, then large amounts of taxpayer funds are put at risk for ineffective use.

Dear Mr. Nyce:

On May 21, 2001 I submitted a statement to the PA DOH, Bureau of Community Program Licensure and Certification, expressing the opposition of the northeast regional Single County Authorities to the proposed repeal of the regulations governing the standards for approval of prevention and intervention activities within the Commonwealth. This opposition was based on the lack of an alternative certification process in place to assume the responsibilities of the Bureau.

As a member of the work group which met monthly over a two year period revising the standards to address state-of-the-art practices and approaches to prevention, I can state that our primary concern was to preserve the integrity and professionalism of the field.

While no one questions the need for the regulatory oversight of the treatment system, it is worrisome that the same concern does not seem to apply to the prevention field. It should be noted that it is prevention specialists and the programs they represent that are in the forefront of the battle against substance abuse. It is absolutely critical that the communities and schools they serve be assured of their knowledge and expertise. This can only be achieved through an ongoing certification and credentialing process.

The need to maintain baseline standards for prevention should not be interpreted as an effort to deny a role to grassroots groups in responding to the needs of their communities. In fact such groups have long had the support of the Single County Authorities in developing and delivering innovative programs to their respective target populations. Rather it should be seen as an affirmation of the evolutionary process which has raised the field of prevention to a recognized and respected component within the substance abuse delivery system.

In closing let me state that requiring compliance with regulatory standards should not be considered an undue burden but a means to measure, support and enhance program performance. It is our hope that deregulation be re-evaluated and an alternative process be instituted in the immediate future to protect the integrity of the prevention field.

Regarding the proposed repeal of regulations governing the standards for approval of prevention and intervention activities within the commonwealth, I wish to express my concern for our communities and the lack of standards for prevention activities.

I am very distressed about the deprofessionalism of prevention and the fact that once again, our field is becoming secondary in importance to treatment. We are reverting back to the '70's where every and anything was done in the name of prevention, at the taxpayers' expense. I believe that the experience, training, skills, knowledge, and methodology of the prevention field are just as, if not more important than those in the treatment field, and we should not allow our field to be given a back seat.

Yes, licensing is a chore, but it is a necessity to ensure the quality of our work, to set some standards for prevention, and to validate to the community and the human service system just who we are and what we do. It assures that we are accountable to the state and to the taxpayer for the services we provide and the funds that we receive to provide them.

Yes, the current standards are outdated, but for two years a committee met to revise them. Prevention has changed since those standards were developed and the standards are outdated. I certainly would hope the treatment field has changed and grown also, and will continue to do so and that their licensing standards are revisited and revised to reflect that.

Licensure or approval should not be eliminated, until another system is developed to replace it. Quality is an issue here! As a concerned parent, a taxpayer and a certified prevention professional, I am outraged!!!


