Regulation No. 16A-6310 State Board of Psychology Computerized Examinations

On November 14, 2001, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the State Board of Psychology (Board). This rulemaking amends 49 Pa. Code Chapter 41. The proposed regulation was published in the December 1, 2001 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on October 3, 2002.

The Board is amending its regulations because the national portion of the licensure examination is now administered by computer and is available more frequently. Under the statute (63 P.S. § 1206(c)), if a person fails an examination, they cannot take a second examination until after "the expiration of six months and within two years." The final regulation reflects the statutory restrictions to retake examinations and adds clarification to the various fees charged to retake the examination.

We have determined this regulation is consistent with the statutory authority of the Board (63 P.S. § 1203.2(1)) and the intention of the General Assembly. Having considered all of the other criteria of the Regulatory Review Act, we find promulgation of this regulation is in the public interest.
