#### Northern Area Personal Care Home Administrators Association Mission Statement and By-Laws

#### Mission Statement:

The Northern Area Personal Care Home Administrators Association (NAPCHAA) is a professional organization of personal care/assisted living facilities and other healthcare support services dedicated to providing quality care, awareness of governmental issues, education and mutual support for the residents and the families we serve in Western Pennsylvania.

#### By-Laws:

NAPCHAA shall be compromised of an Executive Board, made up of duly elected officers from general membership. The Executive Board will meet quarterly, these meetings are also open to general membership and will be held on a rotating basis through out Western Pennsylvania. Executive Board meetings and Regular monthly meetings will be held on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday of each month. All meetings will start at 11:30am and conclude by 1:30pm. Members are encouraged to assume additional responsibilities as developed by the Executive Board and approved by general membership.

#### The Executive Board:

- 1. The Executive Board shall consist of 6 officers and 15 Board members. The officers shall be the President, Vice President of Membership Affairs, Vice President of Legislative Affairs, Vice President of Education Affairs, Recording Secretary and Treasurer. Each member county shall also have a seat on the board which are the County Coordinator. The Counties are the following: Allegheny, Armstrong, Beaver, Butler, Clarion, Crawford, Erie, Fayette, Greene, Indiana, Lawrence, Mercer, Venango, Washington, and Westmoreland County.
- Board members shall be elected to a one year term. The terms in office shall be from January 1<sup>st</sup> to December 31<sup>st</sup>. Board members are to be elected at the general meeting prior to January 1<sup>st</sup>.
- 3. It is recommended that candidates for the Executive Board be active members of NAPCHAA. It is necessary to be familiar with and understand the functions and duties to assure that members can adequately perform those duties.
- 4. The Executive Board by majority vote, can request the resignation of a member who is not performing his/her duties adequately, as described in these By-Laws. The general membership will then elect a new member to the Executive Board.

#### **Executive Board Responsibilities:**

The following descriptions are not intended to be all inclusive of duties. It is important to be flexible and allow certain tasks to be interchangeable in order to allow each member to exhibit his/her special talents and skills for an optimal functioning board.

- President Responsible for coordinating general membership and the Executive Board meetings; coordinate communication between membership and Executive Board, establish the direction of NAPCHAA. Assigns duties and helps as necessary. Oversees the Executive Board. Oversees membership, legislative concerns and education of membership.
- 2. Vice President of Membership Affairs Is the right hand of the President, running meetings in the absence of the President. Maintains the current roster of members. Oversees the 15 County Coordinators. Together with the President and County Coordinators directs each membership drive. Together with the President and each County Coordinator directs communication of the organization to all homes in each County.
- 3. Vice President of Legislative Affairs responsible for overseeing all legislation introduced in the Pennsylvania Legislature. Responsible for overseeing all Regulatory review issues from the Department of Public Welfare and the Office of Licensing and Regulatory Management. Coordinates communications from NAPCHAA with our elected officials and their offices.

- 4. Vice President of Education Affairs responsible for soliciting membership feedback for Continuing Education Credit sessions. Responsible for selecting speakers and working with the President to set two (2) to four (4) separate Continuing Education Credit sessions through out Western Pennsylvania so that all membership may be able to attend. Will Co-Chair the Care Fair each year. Work with the President to develop long term educational programs that may be used in all homes to enhance education to support quality care.
- 5. Recording Secretary Records minutes at the Executive Board and general meetings. Distributes minutes of the general membership meetings in a timely fashion. Retains copies of all documents from the current year for our permanent file. Assists the President in preparation of the newsletter. Assists to ensure that the newsletter is out on time.
- 6. Treasurer Maintains all financial records of NAPCHAA. Collects all dues of the general membership. Collects a late fee for all dues not paid by March 15<sup>th</sup> of each year. Communicates all financial information with the Executive Board. Presents a financial overview of the group to the general membership in December of each year.
- 7. County Coordinators. Each County shall have one (1) Coordinator. 15 County Coordinators total. Responsible for coordinating a membership drive yearly working with the Vice President of Membership Affairs. Maintain an individual communication system with members and non-members in each County to communicate fast paced and important information. Works with the President to locate sites for area meetings.

#### Membership:

Membership is open to all personal care/assisted living Administrators in Pennsylvania. Any member of the administrative teams in NAPCHAA member homes sent by the Administrator. Also, any Healthcare support service business dedicated to providing quality care to our residents.

Voting Rights of Members – To be considered an active member with full voting rights your dues must be paid in full each year. Dues paying roster will be maintained by the Treasurer.

#### Standing Committees:

The Executive Board will appoint NAPCHAA Committee assignments as necessary. Two standing NAPCHAA committee's are: "The Care Fair" is an educational forum for our community. The purpose is to educate the community about Personal Care/Assisted Living and the supportive services available to caregivers, congregations and others in the community. The Care Fair shall be held in the fall of each year and offer Flu Shoots to the general public to encourage attendance. The Vice President of Education Affairs will Co-Chair the Committee with one member from general membership. "The Legislative Committee" will keep an eye on new legislation and regulatory matters in Harrisburg. The Legislative Committee will suggest action to the general membership. The Vice President of Legislative Affairs will Co-Chair the Committee with one member from general membership.

The Executive Board, by majority vote, can request the resignation of a member of a committee who is not performing his/her duties adequately, as described in these By-Laws.



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#### 2001 A Year in Review/Here Comes 2002

10 years ago our Personal Care/Assisted Living Industry was still in its infancy. During this time we have seen tremendous growth as the consumer continues to look for alternatives to the nursing home industry. Today there are 33,000 licensed PCH/AL facilities. And between 800,000–1 Million consumers reside with us. Let us look at Pennsylvania, 1,826 licensed PCH/AL facilities and 51,461 consumers reside with us.

Why start out this way? Because the past year and the immediate future are the results of the growth in our industry. Many sources spell out allegations against our industry—consumer complaints, press reports, DPW Audits and lastly our own Auditor General report by Robert Casey. Most allegations stem from below standard levels of care, neglect, staffing shortages, inadequate follow up by oversight agencies (DPW in Pa.) and no federal oversight.

Our growth truly reflects the unmet demand for housing services among consumers who are looking for more independence than a nursing home. The nursing home industry had their great growth through out the 60's and 70's. Mostly due to the introduction of government reimbursement in 1965. Nursing home allegations at that time brought about a set of heavily regulated process to follow. Many well needed, many overdone. The aim was to protect the consumer.

Therefore, 2001 was an overall good year for we the administrator's of PCH/AL facilities in Pennsylvania. A new set of regulations were presented to our industry. Adult Residential Regulations would have combined 8 different types of residential facilities into one rule book. Due to the efforts of so many of you who went out of your way to be heard, the Adult Residential Regulation process was halted. Those regulations would have truly been overdone. Raising the cost for the provider to be passed onto the consumer. I believe we have said enough on this in past newsletters but, I salute the Department of Licensure for setting up such a great process to be heard in person by testifying, written letters, E-mail and taking hundreds of phone calls. Through all of these vehicles the Department of Licensure listened and acted. We thank you so much for that!

The Legislature has also been busy in 2001 in our industry. The House of Representatives brought back House Bill 49 (HB 1930 last session). The Senate presented their own bill for the first time—Senate Bill 888. House Bill 49 passed the House by an overwhelming vote and has been forwarded to the Senate for consideration. HB 49 was sent to committee and has had no movement on it as of December. The Senate did hold a hearing on SB 888 during Thanksgiving week in Harrisburg. All of the consumer advocates, state affiliates and others presented testimony about SB 888. Unfortunately only a few administrator's testified on SB 888. Thanksgiving week in Harrisburg? No other hearings as of this date scheduled through out the state? Same old Harrisburg operation by the Senate on this bill in our industry.

The aim of both bills is to create "Assisted Living" in Pennsylvania. Currently, homes that are advertising themselves as Assisted Living fall under the Personal care Home Regulations. Don't mention that AL/PCH are "social models" because the Commonwealth believes we are strictly "medical models". Although both bills call for much more paperwork to be a "medical model", only one includes possible government funding to cover cost. This is of course not acceptable. Did you know that New Jersey now provides \$70.00 a day for their Social Security Supplement resident's. Pennsylvania shamefully continues to fall well below that commitment. There are many things that are positive in both bills. Increased training standards for administrators and employees. Different categories of violations and licenses. Both of these benefit good providers.

Where do we go in 2002? Our first priority is the fast track new regulations by the Department of Licensure. Fast tracked before the next governor takes office. Fast track with a change in input. The "draft" regulations will be printed in the March issue of the Pennsylvania Bulletin. Technically 6 months later they become effective. That is how the system has worked in the past. Very rarely are changes made to something once it is printed in the bulletin. Now, we have been assured that we will be heard on these "draft" regulations. If so, why print them in the bulletin. If so, why such a hurry to complete this project. Earlier in this article I saluted the Department of Licensure, I would truly like to do it again in the future. Please—Please Please, let us be part of the process as we were last year.

Our second priority is to encourage the Senate to hold hearings on Senate Bill 888 through out the Commonwealth. I will ask you to call your own local Senator's office and go on record with this. And, I ask you to call Senator Tim Murphy's office in Pittsburgh and deliver the same message. Senator Murphy is the Chairman of the Senate Aging and Youth Committee. He is over both bills in his committee and any future legislation headed his way. Senator Murphy can be reached at 412-344-5583. We the administrators and owners of AL/PCH need to be heard.

## Personal Care Home Regulation Call to Action

The time has come to implement a comprehensive grass roots effort aimed at achieving the stopping of the "fast tracked" Personal Care Home Regulations to be printed in the Pennsylvania Bulletin March, 2002. This issue has gained tremendous momentum due to your efforts. Much discussion is now being held regarding this issue and we are starting to receive support from all over the Commonwealth. We can not stop now. Your help in assuring that the concerns of your residents, your residents families, your employees and you as a provider is most critical at this time.

Write to your Representative and Senator at their home office addresses enclosed. Address your letter to Representatives to "The Honorable (first name, last name) and then their office address. For Senators, address your letter to "The Honorable (first name, last name) followed by their office address. Your opening should read "Dear Senator (last name), for Representatives-Dear Representative (last name).

• Use the following bullet points in the text of your letter, using information specific to your facility:

> Staffing Ratio's for 7:00am-11:00pm for mobile residents, proposed regulations are increasing the level to 1 employee for every 8 residents. The proposed staffing ratios are higher than any other health care facility in Pennsylvania. Higher than hospitals, mental health facilities, drug & alcohol treatment facilities and even nursing homes. Why are Personal Care Homes being held to a higher standard than everyone else. Now would be a opportunity to include your information. What is your ratio. Talk about the high quality of care you are delivering at your ratio. And lastly, Start a total on how much more it would cost each resident just for this one increase. (We'll keep totaling as we go along)

>Staffing Ratio's for 24 hours a day for immobile residents. This is in addition to mobile resident staffing. 1 employee for every 6 immobile residents. Again, nursing homes don't even have to meet this number and almost all of their residents are immobile. We realize this is for fire safety. Now would be a chance to talk about your monthly fire drills, how your immobile residents are on the first floor, closest to the exit. Add if your buildings have sprinkler systems. Anything else you do for fire safety. Again, talk about the high quality of care you are delivering now. And lastly, how much more per month would this cost each resident to add for just this one increase. Plus a running total!

>Current regulations, Direct care staff shall be 16 years of age or older. In the proposed regulations, Direct care staff shall be 18 years of age or older. Proposed regulations give two definitions for Personal care staff and Direct care staff. Both definitions were written by people who have never worked or have been in a PCH. Both definitions are a cross over of responsibility, with both actually doing the same thing. Why 2 age categories? Why two job descriptions doing the same thing? Now would be a good time to share stories of your 16 and 17 year old employees and how well they relate to your residents. How special they are to them and why. Have you had any 16 or 17 year olds work for you and go on to pursue a career in nursing or other health care fields? If so, share them. And lastly, how many staff members would you have to eliminate to meet this regulation. What kind of a staffing shortage would you have from it.

>Current regulations call for us to ASSIST residents with their medications. The proposed new regulations call for us to ADMINISTER medications to our residents. This is a key issue. To comply we would need: A licensed: physician, dentist, physicians assistant, RN, LPN, paramedic, graduate nurse, or a student nurse with faculty on hand. You may have a different hourly rate to use in your area, we used a current average from calls to facilities with nurses on hand:

\$18.00 per hour \$432.00 per day \$3,024.00 per week \$13,392.00 per mont

How much will this cost, if you divided it out among your total residents. When you add this and increased staffing ratio's we estimate that monthly rates could increase from \$200.00 to \$1900.00 per month per resident. Ask your residents and families if they could afford this increase. Ask how you are expected to cover the cost for SSI residents. Ask who will take care of them.

We suggest and support a Staff Medication and Administration Training Program currently in use by MR Community Living Homes, Day Cares and Youth Development Centers and Youth Forestry Camps. These programs are required by 55 PA Code @3800. Why are they good enough for them but, not us?

## **Bullet Points Continued:**

In supporting a Staff Medication Administration Program we realize we will have to pay to send lay staff to class. Pay their salary and demand performance. We support an upgrade from current regulations to this. This would allow all homes to stay in business. And would not close an estimated 60% of all homes!

> We realize that Western Pennsylvania has a very high number of elderly residents. Further, that we are only behind Southern Florida. Also, because of the high number of elderly people means that the acuity level is much higher in this part of the State compared to other areas. Why mention this? Because the original intent of Personal Care Homes was truly a SOCIAL MODEL. We believe, that even with higher acuity levels that we are still a SOCIAL MODEL and not a MEDICAL MODEL (Nursing Home). Nursing Homes have a "cold" and "sterile" feeling to them. Personal Care Homes are "warm", like being at "home" with tremendous "love and care" to our residents. We do not want to be or are we a nursing home. Nursing homes are heavily mandated in paperwork. Heavily mandated in reports. Therefore, they require extra staff just to complete the paperwork. This staff never see the resident because they are so busy completing paperwork.

>The proposed regulations require 42 new written policies and procedures for homes to follow. Don't take us away from our residents. We are hands on people. In our homes, operating them. We do not want to become paper pushers. Again, we are not nursing homes. Nor, do we want to become one.

>We support the increased hours for Administrator training. We support the increase in areas to be covered in the training. Good job! We do not support the new "Qualifications for Administrators": RN, LPN, Associates degree or 60 credit hours in human services, administration or nursing. A licensed Nursing Home Administrator. 21 years old or older. Again, these are qualifications for a medical facility. PCH are not medical models. Those who currently do not meet these requirements will be allowed to continue as long as they complete the new training requirements. Lets be honest in this area. Those who do not meet the proposed requirements should spell out our good inspections, our satisfied residents and families. Our active rolls in the home. Our pride in what we do. We do not want to become a strictly medical model!

> The regulations are being driven by consumer advocates that to paint the entire industry with one incident or one happening. Residents and their families can spell out why they enjoy living with you. Why you have become part of their family and they have become part of your family. Story after story is compelling. Story after story will help educate lawmakers on the job we do!

>Pennsylvania is special because consumers have choice! Consumers can choose a small home with 4 residents, 5, 6, 8, 19, 24, 36, 48, 60, 75, 90, 110, 140 or even 150. Consumers can choose a home that offers what they are looking for. The proposed regulations would close all homes with 50 or less residents leaving only large homes. What happened to choice? Let us keep this special flavor to the industry!

> In closing each letter, ask your Representative, Senator, Governor, Candidate for Governor, Licensing and DPW to write back to you about your letter. Stress how you have taken time and you expect it as a courtesy. Track your responses and let us know of your success.

Thank you, in advance for your assistance in this critical effort. Please call NAPCHAA if we can assist you in any way. Speak loud, speak often and let our voices ring through out Pennsylvania.

## Time is of the Essence / We will Be Vigilant

What a busy month for your NAPCHAA team. On Monday, February 28, 2002 Matt Harvey, Ken Grey and Judy Reynolds traveled to Harrisburg to: 1) check on the current status of the 2600 Personal care Home Regulations, 2) Investigate the Independent Regulatory Review Commission 3) Meet with a Lobbying Firm to determine the advantages and cost involved.

Let's look at the current status. The Proposed regulations were **not** printed in the March issue of the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

We were informed by the Office of Licensing and Regulatory Management (OLRM) that the delay was due to writing the section to allow "lay" personnel to pass medications. We were also informed that OLRM has been working closely with the Governor's Policy Office so that the regulations would move forward in April. Oh yes, they are still going to print them. The fast track has not stopped.

Second, once the regulations

are printed in the Pennsylvania Bulletin they automatically begin a 60 day review process through the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC). How does this work. The IRRC will take written comments for the first 30 days. Written comment must be very specific, well organized and have specific recommendations for areas of disagreement. Mainly suggestion to come to common ground. At the end of the 30 days, the regulations then move to the Legislature for 20 days. This is also done automatically and it is up to the leadership of the House and Senate to assign them to a specific committee. In the House they would be assigned to the Aging and Older Adult Services Committee with Representative Jere Schuler® as Chairman or the Health and Human Services Committee with Representative George T. Kenney, Jr. (R) as Chairman. In the Senate they would be assigned to Aging and Youth Committee with Senator Timothy Murphy ® as Chairman

or the Health and Welfare Committee with Senator Hal Mowery ® as Chairman. During this 20 day period the Committee's will accept written comments. We are strongly urging the Chairman to call for hearings but, we have been informed that this is very rare in this time period. Therefore, we have begun to set up meetings with each of the 4 Chairman now. We already have a working relationship with two. Again, comments must be very specific, well organized with specific recommendations for any and all changes. The last phase of the comment period is 10 days at the IRRC.

Have the IRRC or Legislative Committee's made changes in the past? YES. All public comment received must be recorded and answered during these 60 days. The assigned committee's have great power to stop the regulations from moving forward, request changes or even possibly to disapprove of the regulations. Continued Page 2

NAPCHAA membership has responded in an overwhelming grass roots effort to bring this matter to our own Legislators. We as an organization have stated repeatedly that we believed that the Legislature would listen. It was clear and obvious that OLRM and DPW did not listen by the 2nd draft they put out in January of this year.

In February we asked you to write your Legislator (41 in our counties), State Senators (9 in our Counties), Governor Schweiker, Department of Public Welfare (4 officials in Harrisburg), Office of Licensing and Regulatory Management (2 officials in Harrisburg) and lastly the 3 candidates Bob Casey, Ed Rendell and Mike Fisher who are running for Governor. NAP-CHAA salutes you the Administrator's for helping to educate our policy makers in this grass roots effort. We as an organization heard back from 35 Representatives, 7 Senators and all 3 candidates running for Gover-

NAPCHAA salutes the following for quick response and their input this month: Representative Frank LaGrotta, Representative Susan Laughlin, Representative David Mayernik, Representative Mike Turzai, Representative Paul Costa, Representative Thomas Michlovic, Representative John Pippy, Representative Jeff Coleman, Representative Guy Travaglio, Representative Daryl Metcalfe, Representative Thomas Tangretti, Representative Ted Harhai. Also, Senator lane Clare Orie and Senator Allen G. Kukovich.

Had we waited until the final draft of the 2600 regulations had come out, we would have missed the opportunity to continue to develop ongoing relationships with our leaders. You as Administrators, your residents, their families and many of your employees got to be in-

volved in this process as well. Yes, phones rang off the hook in many offices and lots and lots of mail had to be opened and answered. A job well done!

Now, we must prepare for the most important part of the next phase-the 30 day comment period. All state stakeholders are to receive copies of the final draft within 2 to 3 weeks. It should also be posted on the DPW website. NAP-CHAA will make copies available immediately in the SEVEN counties we serve. We will print them and have them available within 24 hours at local locations in each county for pick up. Each home will receive a phone call letting you know when and where to go.

Secondly, NAPCHAA will again form work groups to review the regulations sentence by sentence, paragraph by paragraph and page by page. All are invited to attend and participate. These workshops will be held in each County to encourage your participation. This will happen very very fast since we only have a 30 day window for written comment. We realize that the last week of March is Easter and will keep many of us busy in our Homes. Maybe that is when OLRM will put them out? The work of these work groups will be to be very specific, very accurate, very thorough, including detailed specific suggestions for any and all recommended changes. Once NAPCHAA concludes all workshops we will form it into one final report and share it with other regional coalitions, Center for Assisted Living Management, Pennsylvania Assisted Living Association. NAPCHAA report will also be forwarded to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission and the assigned Committee's in the House and Senate.

We will also mail copies of our NAPCHAA findings to all homes in Allegheny, Armstrong, Beaver, Butler, Indiana, Lawrence and Westmoreland Counties.

Now you see, TIME is of the essence and we must be VIGILANT

## SSI ADVOCACY NETWORK EDUCATIONAL BRIEFING MARCH 2002

Personal Care Home Residents are Primarily Older Women and Need Supervision

The Department of Public Welfare's data says that personal care home (PCH) residents:

- Are primarily elderly. The number of residents age 85 or over has increased from 35.5% in 1995 to 40.4% in 2000. The percentage of residents age 60 and over is 87.5%. Conversely, only 13% of PCH residents are under the age of 60.
- Are mainly women. In 2000, 68% of PCH residents were female, 32% male.
- Are very frail. 11.4 % of personal care home residents used canes in 2000, 30% use walkers and 13.4% use wheelchairs. Many have visual 19.5% or hearing 13.7% impairments.
- Need supervision. More than one quarter of the residents 25.4% are reported to have dementia(1), 18.8% are reported to have mental illness and 4.7% have mental retardation.
- May be immobile. In 2000, 2,580 PCH residents were immobile, which means "unable to move from one
  location to another or has difficulty in understanding and carrying out instructions without the continued
  full assistance of other persons, or is incapable of independently operating a device such as a wheelchair,
  prosthesis, walker or cane, to exit a building."

SSI Personal Care Home Supplement Recipients:

- Have very low incomes and very few assets. A person can have an income of no more than \$959>30 per month and may only have \$2,000 in countable assets to qualify for the personal care home supplement.
- Make up a stable percentage of the personal care home population. The percentage of personal care
  home residents that utilize SSI and the state supplement as a payment source has remained stable from
  1995 through 2000, at approximately 21%.

<sup>(1)</sup> Because Alzheimer's Association estimates that one in 10 persons over 65 and nearly half of those over 85 have Alzheimer's disease, we think this characteristic may be underreported in the data DPW receives from PCHs.



### **KNOWYOUR MEDICARE RIGHTS**

More than 2 million people in Pennsylvania are enrolled in Medicare. Unfortunately, many of these people are not aware of their rights under the system.

Every Medicare beneficiary has the right to receive quality health care, be admitted to a hospital if it is medically necessary and stay in the hospital until it is medically safe to leave.

In an effort to both pro-

tect the Medicare rights of the patients and to ensure they are receiving the best possible care, the federal government has appointed various peer review organizations to assess the care provided to Medicare recipients.

KePRO is Pennsylvania's peer review organization. It works under contract with the Centers for Medicare and Medical Services, which is the federal agency that oversees the Medicare pro-

gram. **KePRO** provides its services free to all Medicare beneficiaries, even those enrolled in health maintenance organizations.

If you have questions about your rights under the Medicare program, or feel that any of those rights have been violated, call **Ke-PRO's hotline at 1-800-322-1914.** The hotline is staffed from 9:00 a.m. to 3 p.m. weekdays.

Pennsylvania's General Fund revenue had fallen short of expectations by \$438 million as of January 2002. Unfortunately, the state cannot predict the total shortfall for the fiscal year, since it is early in the year.

The revenue picture will probably change significantly in the coming months. In fact, Gov. Schweiker's administration recently increased its estimate of the budget shortfall by more

than 50 percent, to \$622 million. The most significant watch will be March and April, as personal income tax checks will begin to come in. Taxpayers will owe final payments in April for taxes on non-wage income, such as interest, dividends and capital gains. The non-wage income includes income and profits from business, like limited liability companies and Subchapter S companies. The state will also watch

corporate tax receipts because first quarter estimate payments from calendar year taxpayers are due in March 2002. Also, like personal income taxpayers, calendar year corporate taxpayers



Families would not be able to afford caretakers on an SSI income thus no ability to get a break. NAPCHAA, Pepper & Hamilton working to negotiate and come to common ground with consumer actiocates and DPW/OLRM.

As of this printing, the proposed regulations are scheduled to be printed in the Pennsylvania Bulletin the 1st to 2nd week of May. We salute DPW/OLRM for pushing back the printing to continue to make changes to the regulations.

Here are other changes that have been made to date:

- Staffing ratio's have been eliminated and the current 2620 language is accepted. 1 hour for mobile/2 hours for immobile residents. Support plan must state who needs more care if necessary.
- 16 & 17 year olds are returned to duty to provide

- direct care. NAPCHAA is negotiating on stipulations put into place. We do not believe they are necessary.
- Language is being changed that requires a separate activity room. The intent was to have puzzles and materials available for resident's at all times. Not a separate room.
- Qualifications for Administrator's have been dropped. (ie-RN, LPN, etc.) Changes have been made to Administrator training instead.
- Administrator Training
   120 hours classroom time.
   160 hours on the job training. Testing at both

intervals.

- Nursing Home Administrators would be required to take the initial test from the 120 hour class. Also be required to do 40 hours of on the job training.
- Annual screening within 30 days before or after anniversary date.
- Standardized Screening tool within 72 hours of admission. Resident and Legal Guardian to be involved in process.

# 3 HOMES CLOSE IN SOUTHEASTERN PENNSYLVANIA

The Department of Public Welfare has accepted a voluntary closure from 3 homes in Philadelphia. The 3 homes house 287 residents. This is the largest undertaking by DPW in doing assessments on all 287 residents and helping them find another home within 60 days.

DPW has appointed a Manager to oversee the closure of the 3 homes. She is Francis Smith. Kathy Gerrity, Welfare Program Executive and Bea Perkins Head of the Philadelphia Field Office are on site and visiting each home 3 times a day to ensure residents needs are being met. Duane Valance, Phil Lehman, Diane Kutzer and John Pinchotti are alos helping cover the 3 homes.

From Harrisburg Secretary Feather Houston, Bill Gannon and Bev Doherty are overseeing the move.

Each resident receives an assessment which covers. physical, behavioral and options. The assessments are being completed by the Mental Health/Mental Retardation Philadelphia office. Philadelphia Corporation on Aging and Veterans Association. The group that completes the assessment on the resident then tours the resident to other homes to help them find a home they want to go to. They then over see the move and transportation of the resident.

Each residents also offered a choice of consumer advocate if they choose to have one accompany them through out the process. They could choose from an Ombudsman, Health Law Project or South Eastern Pennsylvania Mental Health Association.

Once the resident is

moved DPW will follow up as needed and no less than twice during the first month.

What are the reasons for the voluntary closure? According to Bill Gannon, SSI Supplement of 80 residents in building, high negative media coverage, results of DPW inspections, complaint inspections, community issues and life/safety of residents made it the only appropriate action.

To date, 1/3 of the residents have been relocated. A small number have been placed in nursing homes, some have returned to their families and community and the vast majority have moved to other licensed personal care homes.

We salute the Department of Public Welfare for their extraordinary effort in taking care of these residents.

#### **REGULATION UPDATE - CALL TO ACTION**

The posting of the regulations in the Pennsylvania Bulletin has been delayed until late summer as of this printing. We have been informed that the regulations have been completed, circulated through the Department of Public Welfares Executive Staff, and will be delivered to the Governors office on Friday, June 21, 2002.

Don't forget that the Independent Regulatory Review Commission will have them for 30 days, the House and Senate Committee's for 20 days and back to the IRRC for 10 days. Then the IRRC will issue a final report to DPW whom can accept the regulations as they are or make changes before posting.

NAPCHAA is disappointed that the regulations have been forwarded while work is still being completed on them. Currently important work is being done by committees made up of we the providers,

consumer advocates and DPW/OLRM personnel. All members and attendees of the Pennsylvania Personal Care Home Advisory Board.

What work are these committees doing? They are completing work on the "Assessment Tool and how it applies to the "Care Plan", Waivers and Grand fathering and lastly Staff Training and Hours.

#### SSI ADVOCACY NETWORK EDUCATIONAL BRIEFING

What are Medicaid Waivers?

Q: What is Medicaid?

A: Medicaid is a jointly funded Federal-State health program for certain low-income and needy people. It covers approximately 36 million people and is the major source of public funding for long-term care services.

Q: What is a Medicaid Waiver?

A: When it began in 1965, Medicaid provided services in institutional settings. In 1981, Congress authorizes the Medicaid 1915 Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) Waiver program to allow states flexibility to offer different types of services to individuals with chronic disabilities. The waiver allows states to waive Medicaid requirements so that, for waiver programs:

- Services do not have to be provided statewide;
- States can use more liberal financial eligibility criteria; and
- Designated groups can be given benefits that other groups don't receive.

Q: Must a person go into a nursing home to qualify for a Medicaid waiver?


A: No. Although functional eligibility criteria for most waivers are similar to eligibility for nursing home care, a person need not have resided in a nursing facility at any point in order to qualify.

Q: What are the eligibility requirements in Pennsylvania?



A: To be eligible for the Pennsylvania Department of Aging (PDA) Waiver, a person must have income less than \$1,593/month (as of August 2001) and less than \$2,000 in assets. In addition, the person must be age 60 or older and either disabled or nursing home eligible. The person must be able to be appropriately served in the community at a cost not to exceed 80% of the average Medical Assistance payment for nursing facility services in Pennsylvania and musty choose to receive services in their own home or a community setting. There are other waiver programs in Pennsylvania that target other groups and have different eligibility requirements.

Q: If a person qualifies for the waiver, what services can he or she receive?





Q: Can a person receive these services in a Personal Care Home?

A: Although there is one small pilot project to study the concept of allowing residents of personal care homes to use waivers, current policy if that Pennsylvanians who reside in personal care homes can not receive waiver services.

Yes, great progress has been made. DPW/OLRM have visited Western Pennsylvania and listened to 170 providers. Toured many homes to see how the proposed regulations would effect these homes. Yes, NAP-CHAA and our lobbyist have been very active in Harrisburg with DPW/OLRM, the Governors Office, the Health & Welfare Committees in the House and Senate.

So, let NAPCHAA ask again - WHAT IS THE AHURRY? Why submit regulations that are not complete, and work is still be completed on? Could someone tell us why?

# LET US BE CLEAR ABOUT NAPCHAA POSITION ON CURRENT STATUS OF REGULATIONS

Let us be very clear about NAPCHAA's current stand on the status of the proposed 2600 draft regulations. We understand that it is the process and the policy that all regulations go to the Governor's office for approval before publishing.

In studying the past 3 years of the regulatory process in Pennsylvania, no agency has submitted changes to the regulations once they

were approved by the Governor's office and sent to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission. That is the issue.

Our concern is that several issues are INCOM-PLETE and still WORKING. We have been told that these would be added while the regulations are at the IRRC. History of the past three years does not show this to be the case.

So, is our position clear now? Yes. Has it changed this summer? No.

Who is in such a hurry to rush these regulations through while they are incomplete.? No one has ever answered that question for us and, we guess that no one ever will. Whether it be Secretary Houstoun, Governor Schweiker or someone else. Can't someone just stand up and accept responsibility?

That is the position of the NORTHERN AREA PERSONAL CARE HOME ADMINISTRATORS ASSOCIATION.

# GENERAL ASSEMBLY APPROVES LANDMARK LEGAL REFORM

#### FAIR SHARE ACT WILL HELP ENSURE ACCESS TO QUALITY CARE

The General Assembly approved, and the Governor signed into law, a significant reform to Pennsylvania's civil justice system. The Fair Share Act, sponsored by **Rep. Mike Turzai** in the House, partially repeals the legal doctrine of joint and several liability and implements a system of comparative responsibility in which a defendant in a civil case is required to pay only a share of the award equal to his responsibility for damages caused.

Under the prior law, if a court determined that a defendant was even one percent at fault for someone's injury then he could be held responsible for paying the entire sum of the award if the other defendants were financially unable to do so.

Civil cases often turn into a hunt for defendants with the greatest financial resources, even if they were only remotely connected to the case or minimally responsible. Those types of frivolous lawsuits and nuisance settlements have invariably contributed to higher health care costs and exorbitant malpractice insurance premiums, creating a crisis in Pennsylvania.

"The malpractice legal system designed to police our health care community is actually driving it out of business and is threatening both access to care and the quality of that care," Rep. Turzai said.

Personal care facilities work diligently to serve and support our senior population. A community of nurses and caregivers demonstrate a strong commitment to the care of these seniors. According to Rep. Turzai, "Personal care homes and their hard-working employees provide dignity and quality of life to many of our elderly, particularly those whose life is failing them. Too often, both an organization and its employees are subjected to shotgun lawsuits designed to produce nuisance settlements. Enactment of the Fair Share Act should help reduce the number of these frivolous claims."

The legislation eliminates the joint and several principle entirely for defendants in civil cases found to be less than 60 percent liable and requires that a defendant be held responsible for only his or her share of the liability. So if a court deems someone responsible for 10 percent of the fault, that defendant will be responsible for only 10 percent of the total award.

"The Fair Share Act is a common sense solution that will restore balance and fairness to the judicial system. It is based upon the principle that compensation is fair when it is paid in accordance with ones' relative fault, no one's ability to pay," Rep. Turzai said.

This new law will ultimately benefit health care providers burdened by frivolous lawsuits and skyrocketing insurance premiums, and help to ensure that every Pennsylvanian continues to have access to the best health care service available.

#### SSI ADVOCACY NETWORK EDUCATIONAL BRIEFINGS

Funding Gap in Pennsylvania Identified as Major Access Barrier for Low Income Elderly Tenants of Supportive Housing in Need of Personal Care Home

In 2000, PANPHA, an Association of Pennsylvania Nonprofit Senior Services, asked its 50 members with government-subsidized supportive housing for the elderly about tenants who needed a personal care home in the past year. Fourteen properties, representing various areas of the state, responded to the survey. The average tenant's age was 76 and the average annual income was \$11,349.

Most of these housing developments are atypical in that they provide services such as meals, laundry, and housekeeping and employ service coordinators to help tenants access community services. Perhaps because of the many services available on-site, less than 10% of these tenants needed a personal care home. For those who did, however, finding an acceptable situation was difficult.

- "For those who have needed personal care homes in the past year, several are still in their apartment, "getting by" with services from the AAA, etc., one lives in an assisted living facility in Florida, and several went to nursing facilities instead. The difficulties are all related to finances. Services that become difficult to manage in the housing setting are when there is dementia or when the resident needs assistance monitoring their medications."
- "...the main issue for our residents rests with income. A higher level of care is required but there is no source of funding available to pay for it. We try to provide assistance through various sources, however, this assistance is usually minimal and often limited. Some residents have a minimum of support from family but in most cases, the support is just not enough. Fellow residents will "help out" for a period of time but in some respect that seeks to "mask" conditions and circumstances that really need to be dealt with. In the end, many people remain in independent living until they can "qualify" for nursing home placement thus reducing the quality of life substantially....this level of assistance {personal care home} is just not available to our resident population at this time."
- Last year, five tenants needed the services of a personal care home, "all were women in their 90's; three were mentally impaired, two were physically impaired. They needed personal care, medication assistance, cleaning assistance and meals." Property staff is not available to handle these kinds of services, but a service coordinator does assist tenants to access home health and other outside services. Tenants are accommodated with needed services until they reach a point that it becomes obvious that they need round the clock care, then the family, responsive church organizations and the local Area Agency on Aging are called in to find placement. Unfortunately, SSI beds are few and far between and often the tenant's physical or mental condition precipitates an emergency situation that lands them in the hospital. From there the hospital social worker becomes responsible for placing the tenant in a round the clock care facility.
- "Tenants who need a greater level of care than we can provide, or they can arrange for, invariably move to
  nursing facilities, spending down until they are Medicaid-eligible. One recent tenant who moved...spent
  all of her modest savings on one month of care at a private assisted living facility until the county bed
  opened."
- "Our residents have an extremely limited income and assisted living is expensive. People who cannot afford at least \$1200 per month have a limited choice." "We had an 80-year old female resident who became frightened of being alone following a stroke. She needed assistance in dressing, bathing, making meals and cleaning. Her son lived with her but his care taking was inconsistent and unreliable. She became panicked that she could not manage her life and had to be re-hospitalized. At that times he and her family were offered a boarding home placement. Her family looked at it, was very disappointed and refused to allow her to go there. She was re-evaluated and found to need nursing home placement. She will be long term."

These stories and statistics illustrate that in spite of the presence of a rich service package, some tenants need the 24-hour care provided by a personal care home. They are frail, impoverished 70, 80, and 90 year olds, typically women, who need supervision due to serious health conditions, dementia or mental illness and they are not receiving the care they need because the current funding system does not provide for them.

#### REGULATIONS APPROVED BY GOVERNOR

During the final days of August the proposed 2600 regulations were approved and signed off by the Governors office. Only 2 changes were made to the final draft that we as providers have yet to see.

Change #1) Medication errors must be reported immediately. Change #2) Seeing eye dogs and/or other service dogs are permitted in the diningroom.

The proposed regulations are now in the next step of the process. The regulations now sit in the office of Pennsylvania Attorney General Mike Fisher. The Attorney General has 30 days by law to review them and return them to the Department of Public Welfare.

According to the Office of Regulatory Management, if no major changes are made by the Attorney General then they will move them forward in the process immediately. OLRM is projecting that the regulations will be released back to them by September 25, 2002. Therefore, NAP-CHAA is projecting that the earliest date for the proposed regulations to be printed in the Pennsylvania Bulletin could be September 28, 2002.

It is imperative that we

as providers watch the official printing date closely because that starts the official comment period. You can watch the Pennsylvania Bulletin web site at www. pabulletin.com for the posting. Of course NAPCHAA will begin regional meetings immediately so that we with our lobbyist Pepper and Hamilton may present provider suggestions to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission and the Health & Welfare Committee's in the Legislature.

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#### Senator Jane Clare Orie Leads by Example

Providing and paying for long-term and personal care for our senior citizens are quickly becoming some of the most serious issues facing Pennsylvania's families. With escalating costs for this care and a growing population of senior citizens, more and more families must deal with the affordability and availability of these services.

As most people know, our state is growing older. In fact, approximately 2.5 million Pennsylvanians are age 60 or older and almost 255,000 are over the age of 85. Senior citizens make up 16% of our state's population. Projections are that those numbers will continue to grow as we move into the next millennium. Pennsylvania has the third-largest senior population with more than 770 nursing care facilities and 1800 personal care homes. People are not only living longer, they are also spending more time in a care setting.

According to a recent state Department of Aging (DOA) report, nursing facilities are the primary publicly funded option for Pennsylvanians, at an average cost of more than \$40,000 per year. More than 40% of Pennsylvanians over the age of 65 will enter a nursing home. And 10% of those entering a nursing home will stay there at least 5 years. In addition, an estimated 750,000 Pennsylvanians need long-term care services, but most do not have means to pay for the care.

Families today can find themselves caring for four generations: their children, themselves, their parents and their grandparents. The financial impact can be huge. Under our current system, people work their entire lives only to see their hard-earned savings disappear to pay for this care. We want people to be able to control

their own options for care. The issues and concerns about providing and paying for the care our senior's needs are clear. Unfortunately, the solutions are not.

We have looked at long-term care, nursing homes and personal care only in a piece meal manner. I believe it is time for a comprehensive study of the availability and affordability of care and the state's regulatory role in inspecting and licensing care facilities.

I believe we need to take a careful look at this very important issue-and to seek input from families, long-term care providers and experts in the health care industry. Through the information we receive from experts, advocates and consumers, we hopefully can determine what measures must be put in place to prepare for the growing number of Pennsylvanians who will need these services in the next millennium.

We also need to review state policies and regulations that govern these services to ensure they are current and necessary. Nursing homes are some of the most regulated programs in the Commonwealth. They must meet standards set by numerous state departments including, Public Welfare, Labor and Industry, Aging, Health, Agriculture and Environmental Protection. Some of these regulations are more than 20 years old. As well intended as they may be, we must ensure that irrelevant and or redundant regulations do not result in a drop in the quality of care or unnecessary cost increases for the resi-

At the state level, we are doing our part to make nursing homes safer and protect residents against abuse. DOA now conducts 5,000 inspections annually and maintains a registry of

information on more than 150,00 nursing home employees. In addition, each county maintains an ombudsman for family/resident advocacy. According the Pennsylvania Health Care Association, Pennsylvania is "ahead of the curve" in preventing abuses because we have passed laws to mandate that nurse aides be educated about the issue and requires criminal background checks for potential employees. I was a key player in these efforts to protect the elderly residents and establish new requirement to make our nursing homes safer. They've been extremely effective.

But we need to do more to ensure that patients receive quality care-and one important area that I have been involved in is finding ways to ease the nursing shortage here in Pennsylvania. Our facilities are chronically understaffed and that hurts patient care.

Since 1995, admissions to all three types of nursing education programs - associate degree, hospital based schools and baccalaureate - have declined by 40%. Hospital vacancy rates for registered nurses are now estimated at 10%. Similar numbers for nursing homes, where increase in older population is making the problem worse.

That's why I strongly supported a new law (Act 83 of 2001), which created a new loan forgiveness program. The law helps new nurses pay off up to \$50,000 in student loans, provided they agree to work in Pennsylvania for at least three years. I also voted for a new medical malpractice reform law that is aimed at bringing down rising malpractice insurance rates that are hitting personal care, nursing homes and hospitals hard.

At nursing homes, liability cost have soared by as much as 250 percent (Continued on Page 4)

Thank you for allowing me to update our concerned citizens on issues relating to personal care homes. I realize the importance of personal care homes and understand that additional laws and regulations can adversely effect those who provide personal care home services.

In March, I participated in a meeting sponsored by NAPCHAA in Armstrong County with many personal care home owners. I found this meeting to be extremely beneficial for all parties involved and it was very clear to me that these owners are on the frontline of the long-term health care issue and know best how to address regulating the industry.

It is essential that the Department of Public Welfare recognize the valuable services that personal care homes offer. An ongoing public outreach policy with external stakeholders is essential so that DPW can find a compromise that will improve the operation of personal care homes. Secretary of DPW, Feather O. Houstoun, is working diligently to provide a package that will provide the best health and safety measures for the residents of personal care homes. Secretary Houstoun has assured me that the Department will continue to consult with those who will be affected by these regulations and base any necessary changes on the input they receive during the consultation process.

DPW has issued an updated preview version of the PCH Regulations to groups representing personal care home residents, providers and advocates. You may access a copy by contacting the Western office at 412-565-5614 or on the web at <a href="https://www.dpw.state.pa.us/Lic/licPCHPreview.asp">www.dpw.state.pa.us/Lic/licPCHPreview.asp</a>.

I would also like to update you on the status of House Bill 49 of 2001 and Senate Bill 888, which require DPW to serve as the lead agency in the development of a program for regulating and licensing adult living residences in the Commonwealth.

The legislation is currently being considered by the Senate Aging and Youth Committee as a result of a meeting on HB49 and SB888, held in November 2001.

(Continued from Page 2) And facilities were getting even higher quotes for renewals. That is why a new law - Act 13 of 2002 - is so important. It is designed to ensure access to doctors, reduce litigation, improve patient safety, and strengthen physician reporting requirements. The law also targets medical errors and establishes state Patient safety Authority and requires medical facilities to create patient safety committees. Committees will collect information on incidents that injured - or could have injured - patients.

Medical facilities will have to es-

tablish a patient safety plan, including a system for employees to be able to report incidents 24 hours a day, every day, without retaliation.

All these reforms will help to make health care more available and affordable, and improve quality of care that residents and patients receive. These

goals are important, particularly in the growing area of long term care.

#### A Call to Service

The only amendment made and approved was that each County Representative be appointed for next year only and elected each year after.

Together as PROVIDERS we can, will and have made a great difference. That difference is do to each of your efforts. Communicating, sharing, networking and committed - that is base for success.

It is official, the proposed 2600 "Draft" regulations will be available October 4, 2002 at www.pabulletin.com. All members should have received a broadcast fax from NAPCHAA letting you know. Enter the Pennsylvanian Bulletin on the current issue and then page down to the Department of Public Welfare. Double click on the 2600 draft regulations and print.

We have been informed that the draft is 75 pages in total. NAPCHAA will **not** be mailing out copies to all homes. If you do not have access to a computer please call 1-412-364-6411 ext 228 and leave your name and address and we will mail a copy to you promptly.

Sadly, many of the concerns that we as PROVIDERS have

expressed for 18 months continue to be left intact in the regulations. Yes, some changes were made. We appreciate the Office of Licensing and Regulatory Management taking the time. Unfortunately we were unable to get critical changes that are needed for our residents FIRST and we providers SECOND.

There are no doubts that the Industry has changed through the years. NAPCHAA still maintains that if DPW would have enforced the 2620 regulations all along, many of the proposed regulations would not be needed. (Please see page 2)

It is also clear that the move is to shift us towards the Nursing Home side. As many of you know, a nursing home administrator and many department heads spend countless hours filling out paperwork for the government. I for one love spending time with my residents, their families and working with my employees. Unfortunately the new regulations require a tremendous amount of paperwork and we then have a choice: we do it and have no time for our residents or we hire someone to complete the paperwork and we have to pass the cost onto the resident.

Our residents are with us for our warm atmosphere, our quality of care, our home setting and the satisfaction of them and their families. Our current mix of small, medium and large homes give our residents choice. Choices they have made and should not be taken away. (See Page 7.)

#### Violations = Classification = Penalties & Fines



Please review sections 2620.81 and 2620.82 from regulations.

The Department of Public Welfare has been doing extensive testing in the North East Region of Pennsylvania on enforcing sections 2620.81 Classification of violations and 2620.82 Penalties.

Many administrators had been advised by their Licensing Representatives that full enforcement of the above sections would take place effective October 1, 2002. In meetings with Deputy Secretary Bill Gannon and phone calls to regional offices NAPCHAA had sought that all homes be notified of this change in writing from the DPW first. Secretary Gannon has agreed to send letters and start the enforcement piece effective October 7, 2002.

Changes to take place in the inspection process would be: #1 Licensing Representatives will complete the On-Site Inspection Report in its entirety at the home. In doing so, any and all violations will be classified by Class I, II or III violations. (2620.81) Class I violations have a substantial probability of resulting in death or serious mental of physical harm to a resident.

Class II violations have a substantial adverse effect upon the health, safety or well being of a resident.

Class III violations are minor violations which have had an adverse effect upon the health, safety or well-being of a resident.

#2 The Licensing Representative will assess a penalty for each violation. (2620.82) A) The Department will assess a penalty for each violation of this chapter. B) Penalties will be assessed on a daily basis

from the date on which the citation was issued until the date the violation is corrected, except in the case of Class II violations. C) In the case of a Class II violation, assessment of the penalty will be suspended for 5 days from the date of the citation to permit sufficient time for the licensee to correct the violation. This time period may be extended for good cause. If the violation is not corrected in the 5-day period, the fine will be retroactive to the date of the citation. D) The Department will assess a penalty of \$20.00 per resident per day for each Class I violation. Each Class I violation shall be corrected within 24 hours. E) The Department will assess a minimum penalty of \$5.00 per resident per day, up to a maximum of \$15.00 per resident per day, for each Class II violation. F) There is no monetary penalty for a Class III violation unless the licensee fails to correct the violation within 15 days. Please refer to your 2620 Regulations for section G-J and numbers 1 - 7. (According to Secretary Gannon the Licensing Representative will levy fines for Class I violations immediately and then continue to redefine Class II and III penalties over the next year. )

#### #3 During the exit interview, the Administrator will complete the Plan of correction.

According to Secretary Gannon this is being done for a few reasons. First it will eliminate the time lapse of waiting for the On-Site Inspection Report.

Also the time lapse of sending the Plan of Correction and then again waiting to see if it is accepted or not. Secondly, if a Plan of Correction is accepted

that day, then that could limit the leveling of the penalty to 1 day only on Class I violations. Remember that Class II violations give you 5 days to correct and Class III violations give you 15 days to correct without the penalty being enforced.

Please watch for a letter from Secretary Gannon and consult your Licensing Representative and your Regional Office with questions and comments.

NAPCHAA Stand on this issue:

We must all realize that these sections have not been enforced since 1991. That DPW made a decision at that time not to do it. Also, that tremendous pressure has been applied to DPW due to Auditor General Casey's report on the Personal Care Home Industry and continued poor press articles about incidents across Pennsylvania.

We must also realize that government intends to fine and penalize instead of encouraging "best practice" and rewarding good performers.

If enforcing these sections eliminates the bad actors in our Industry and improves the overall care for the elderly residents and special populations we serve - then we will stand with the Department, Please be fair in this process and we strongly urge the Department to seek the advice of the PROVIDER. as well as all those involved over the next year to strengthen these sections. Working together for the best interest of the residents we serve.



The Department of Public Welfare has not enforced the Classification of violations and Penalties sections since 1991.

#### The "Woodwork Effect"

What if There was Public Funding for Unmet Consumer Long-Term Care Needs?

What is the "woodwork effect"? The "woodwork effect" is the theory that if additional funding is provided for home and community basedservices (HCBS), people who currently qualify for but would not enter a nursing facility are likely to apply for these services. Since the majority of long-term care in Pennsylvania and the nation is provided by unpaid family caregivers, the idea is that an unknown number of people would "come out of the woodwork" to receive public funded services in either their own home or another residential setting. Rather than focusing on serving additional people, discussions of the "woodwork effect" tend to focus on whether costs can be shifted or saved to achieve budget neutrality and they may also in appropriately assume that HCBS can always serve as an alternative to nursing home care.

What does the research say about the "woodwork" effect? Two major studies conclude that it is manageable. Further, both studies question whether budget neutrality should be a goal, given the level of need is there for HCBS services, and the desire of consumers to remain in their homes and communities. Because the number of elderly people who need services is expected to increase, a more appropriate goal would be to

meet these increasing needs at all levels of care.

A June 2000 study by the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services found that:

- Recent research is leading policymakers in the direction of emphasizing HCBS in residential settings such as personal care homes/ assisted living facilities.
   Some states have been able to avoid building additional nursing home beds by allowing funding for care provided in residential settings.
- Narrow targeting, benefit levels that take into account availability of informal supports, and a strong emphasis on services provided in residential facilities can increase the prospect that HCBS programs will serve those who need them while at the same time controlling costs.

An earlier study by AARP on lessons from community-based care demonstrations found that:

The demand for community-based and in-home services is reasonable and manageable. Indeed, more common than the "woodwork" issue in community-based care demonstrations is recruiting potential clients and families. This is consistent with the findings of other studies that disabled individuals and their families are significantly underutilize formal services relative to care needs as assessed by

professionals.

- Families have not abandon ed older, disabled family members. To the contrary, empirical research continually demonstrates that families are providing more care, more difficult care, and care over longer periods of time than ever before.
- Community long-term care services have not served as a broad-brush alternative to nursing home care and should not be viewed as such. Families nearly always care for their disabled relatives at home until the realistic option is nursing home care.

This report concludes that cost effectiveness comparisons ignore the fact that someone is now bearing the "hidden" costs of home and community-based long-term care. Families bear it with unpaid and unimagined labors of love and responsibility. And the elderly living alone bear the cost in social isolation and deprivation of unmet care needs. Meeting the needs of elderly people for assistance with chronic, longterm impairments, helping families cope, addressing the preferences of older persons and their families, identifying and addressing unmet care needs, and filling a void left by providers and insurers have long been acceptable rationales for public policy. They are policy goals that can be accomplished with reasonable and controlled utilization, with no inappropriate decrease in family support, (Continued Page 6)

Professional Liability Insurance is going up 250-300% Why ????

NAPCHAA has been working on this issue since summer. The State Department of Insurance has been no help at all. Therefore, we have had to do our own homework.

The loss runs for personal care homes is virtually zero or very small. Elopements have been the only incidents showing on our loss runs. This is important and the following comments do not reflect on any incidents that have taken place. We all live in fear of elopements. But, there comes a time when we as providers must look at our own homes and make good decisions on whether we can safely handle an elopement risk or should that resident be moved onto a secure unit or higher level of care? One incident puts the entire industry at risk over increased insurance.

Loss runs for nursing homes run in the thousands and in some cases hundreds of thousands of dollars. This is a concern because in Pennsylvania both personal care homes and nursing homes are combined in the same category. After several meetings with Senators and Representatives we are close to having a bill entered in the House of Representatives seeking to separate the two into different categories. This will take time and is not a quick fix.

Tort reform was passed this year and signed by the Governor which includes personal care homes. We were treated to an article by Representative Mike Turzai in August explaining these changes. This will also take time. We are told that it will take 2-3 years to help our industry.

Many of you have been advised to "self-insure". The cost are impossible for many homes to do this. It is not an option for the majority of personal care homes.

When and if we can get personal care homes and nursing homes separated, then we must bring all Insurance Companies back to the table and market our profession to them. Market the job that we do. Market the positive side of our loss runs,. Market the potential for profit

for them. We can and must do it to STOP these 250 - 300% increases in Professional Liability Insurance.

NAPCHAA has been approached by one company still writing new policies. They were going to submit an article for this Newsletter but missed the deadline. Therefore, let us provide you the following information:


cost only to all attending.

The Pennsylvania Assisted Living Association is respectfully requesting public hearings be held across Pennsylvania on the proposed draft regulations for personal care homes, Title 55, Chapter 2600.

We ask this because:

First, the provider was left out of the process when the draft was written.

Second, many of our members have met with Teletia Nevius and Ellen Gentry, from the Office of Licensing and Regulatory Management, in several meetings across the state and were told suggestions that were made would be incorporated into the draft. On receiving a copy of the draft to be published this week, we found no changes were made.

Third, Secretary Houstoun in her forward to the proposed regulation, top of page 12, states there will be no cost to the public. This is an untrue statement and outrageous for her to have made.

These proposed regulations will not benefit the elderly of Pennsylvania. We would be happy to work on a new draft when the time comes.

Please consider our request for public hearings.
