Proposed Regulation 14-479: Pharmaceutical Services Revisions to Reimbursement

Dear Secretary Houstoun:

I am writing in my capacity as Minority Chair of the Senate Public Health & Welfare Committee. I specifically object to the proposal to reduce reimbursement to pharmacies because I am not convinced that the department has adequately explored alternatives to reducing reimbursement.

For a number of years, the possibility of "carving-out" pharmaceutical services from managed care has been discussed. As I understand it, the "carve-out" would entitle DPW to receive directly pharmaceutical manufacturers' rebates totaling in the tens, if not hundreds of millions of dollars. It has always been unclear whether the "carve-out" would result in a net gain, or net loss to the Commonwealth since there would be an increase in costs to run pharmaceutical services on a fee-for-service basis and it has never been shown whether the rebates would exceed the increased costs. I suggest that a comprehensive analysis be done of this question, once and for all. If carve-out would increase revenues, let's do that instead of this proposal. I am deeply concerned that this proposal may result in the loss of a significant number of small, independent pharmacies. This loss may result in a serious compromise to the adequacy of the network of providers that the public will have and that the department will have available

for MA recipients. To date, I have seen no estimates as to the number, or the locations of pharmacies that will close their doors. Until we know what the impact of this proposal will be on the public in general, and on MA recipients in particular, I do not think that we should go forward.
