Repeal of Obsolete Lottery Regulations

PREAMBLE

The Secretary of Revenue (Secretary), under the authority contained in section 303 of the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. § 3761-303), by this notice of proposed rulemaking omitted, amends 61 Pa. Code by deleting Chapters 817, 831, 867, 868 and 869.

As the selection of on-line games available to lottery players in this Commonwealth changed over the years, regulations relating to the discontinued on-line games remained in Title 61. In accordance with Executive Order 1996-1 and its normal review of Title 61 regulations, the Department of Revenue (Department) determined that the repeal of the regulations not only rids Title 61 of unnecessary regulations, it also alleviates any possible confusion that the appearance of the regulations may raise among those who read the regulations and expect to play these nonexistent games.

Because the regulatory sections proposed to be deleted relate to on-line lottery games that were retired or discontinued with actual notice conveyed through the issuance of press releases and the termination of sales, the Department, under section 204 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L. 769, No. 240) (CDL) (45 P.S. § 1204) and the regulation thereunder, 1 Pa. Code § 7.4, finds that notice of proposed rulemaking is under the circumstances impracticable and, therefore, may be omitted.

Purpose of Regulation

Play of the on-line lottery games subject to repeal under this regulation were concluded in accordance with the terms of the regulations. The Lottery does not intend now or in the near future to offer these games in their stated configuration.

Under section 5.1(c) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(c)), on polyhed 30, ∞ 03, the Department submitted a copy of the regulations with proposed rulemaking omitted to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House Committee on Finance and the Senate Committee on Finance. On the same date, the regulations were submitted to the Office of Attorney General for review and approval under the Commonwealth Attorneys Act (71 P.S. §§ 732-101 - 732-506). In accordance with section 5.1(j.1) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(j.1)), the regulations were (deemed) approved by the Committees on . IRRC met on

and (deemed) approved the regulations under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(e)).

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Findings

The Department finds that the regulatory sections in Chapters 817, 831, 868 and 869 are no longer necessary for administration and enforcement of the authorizing statute. Under section 204 of the CDL, the Department also finds that the proposed rulemaking procedures in sections 201 and 202 of the CDL (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202) are unnecessary because the games were retired or discontinued with actual notice conveyed through the issuance of press releases and the termination of sales and are under the circumstances impracticable.

Order

The Department, acting under the authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Department, 61 Pa. Code, are amended by deleting Chapters 817, 831, 867, 868 and 869 as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The Secretary shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of General Counsel and Office of Attorney General for approval as to form and legality as required by law.

(c) The Secretary shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

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(d) This order shall take effect upon publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin.
