The purpose of these amendments is to allow chiropractors to administer physical examinations for new drivers required under Section 1508(a) of the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa. C.S. § 1508(a). Authority for these amendments is found in Sections 1504(c), 1508(a), 1508.1 and 6103 of the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa. C.S. §§ 1504(c), 1508(a), 1508.1 and 6103. These amendments to the regulation are not mandated by any federal or state law or court order or			

#### federal regulations.

(11) Explain the compelling public interest that justifies the regulation. What is the problem it addresses?

Pennsylvania law requires an applicant for a driver's license to submit to a physical examination. The current provisions of the regulation require that an applicant for a driver's license who has never been licensed in the Commonwealth or another state submit to a physical examination by a licensed physician, a certified registered nurse practitioner or a physician's assistant. Chiropractors are recognized in the healthcare and health insurance industries as portal of care practitioners, that is, primary care providers, permitted to furnish necessary patient care for health maintenance. Chiropractors are also permitted under by federal regulations to conduct the biennial medical examinations for commercial drivers required by Federal Highway Administration Motor Carrier Safety regulations. The addition of chiropractors as provided in this amendment make Department regulations consistent with current health care practices and federal regulations.

(12) State the public health, safety, environmental or general welfare risks associated with non-regulation.

Failure to amend these regulations will continue to prohibit chiropractors from performing the initial physical examination for driver licensing, denying access to recognized health care providers for purposes of complying with required statutory and regulatory provisions.

(13) Describe who will benefit from the regulation. (Quantify the benefits as completely as possible and approximate the number of people who will benefit.)

Individuals who use a chiropractor as their primary care provider will be able to have the examination performed by that provider. Chiropractors will benefit by added recognition as health care professionals. The precise number of individuals or chiropractors who will benefit cannot be determined with any accuracy.

(14) Describe who will be adversely affected by the regulation. (Quantify the adverse effects as completely as possible and approximate the number of people who will be adversely affected.)

There should be no adverse impact on any individuals from these amendments to the regulation.

All applicants for a Pennsylvania driver's license are required to comply with this Chapter. It is not known precisely how many individuals will comply by having the required physical

examination performed by a chiropractor.

These proposed amendments are the result of discussions with the Pennsylvania Chiropractic Association.

#### **Notice of Final Rulemaking**

#### **Preamble**

Notice is hereby given that the Department of Transportation, pursuant to the authority contained in Sections 1504(c), 1508.1 and 6103 of the Vehicle Code, Act of June 17, 1976, P.L. 162, No. 81, as amended (75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1504(c), 1508.1 and 6103), hereby amends Chapter 75 of the Department of Transportation Regulations, Title 67, by amending §§ 75.2 and 75.6, as set forth in Annex A to this Notice.

#### Purpose of Chapter

The purpose of Chapter 75 is to define more fully the requirements of 75 Pa. C.S. §§ 1504(c), 1508, 1508.1(a), 1514(b) and 1607 by listing the specific requirements with regard to each step in the examination process.

#### Purpose of the Proposed Amendments

The current provisions of Chapter 75 require that an applicant for a driver's license who has never been licensed in the Commonwealth or another state submit to a physical examination by a licensed physician, a certified registered nurse practitioner or a

physician's assistant. The purpose of these amendments is to include chiropractors among the listed healthcare providers who can administer a physical examination for these new driver applicants.

Chiropractors are recognized in the healthcare and health insurance industries as portal of care practitioners, that is, primary care providers, permitted to furnish necessary patient care for health maintenance. In 2004, the General Assembly amended the Vehicle Code to specifically authorize Chiropractors to conduct examinations required for the issuance of a driver's license.

Moreover, Chiropractors are permitted under federal regulations to conduct the biennial medical examinations for commercial drivers required by Federal Highway Administration Motor Carrier Safety regulations. The addition of chiropractors as provided in this amendment make Department regulations consistent with current health care practices, the Vehicle Code and federal regulations.

#### Summary of Comments and Changes in Final Adopted Regulation

Public comment was received from the Pennsylvania Academy of Family

Physicians (PAFP) and the Pennsylvania Medical Society (PMS) objecting to the
inclusion of Chiropractors as medical professionals authorized to conduct examinations
required for the issuance of a driver's license. Both organizations argue that
Chiropractors are not medically qualified to conduct the basic medical examination
required under the Vehicle Code. Both argue that Chiropractors lack the training and
experience of Physicians and Doctors of Osteopathy to make sophisticated diagnoses,

particularly with regard to neurological and neuro-psychiatric disorders as well as most physical disorders.

The objections overstate the sophistication of the basic medical examination required under the Vehicle Code. Moreover, these amendments to the Chapter 75 merely conform the regulation to include the authorization of Chiropractors to conduct the required examinations which has already been authorized in the 2004 amendments to the Vehicle Code enacted by the General Assembly and signed by the Governor.

Comments in favor of the regulation were received from the Pennsylvania Chiropractors Association and from Edward J. Krzykwa, Doctor of Chiropractic.

The sole comment of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission was that the definition of "chiropractor" in the Proposed Rulemaking differed slightly from the definition in the Vehicle Code. It was recommended that the definition be revised to conform verbatim to the definition in the statute or be replaced by a reference to the statutory definition. The recommended change to the definition ahs been made.

#### Persons and Entities Affected

These regulations affect chiropractors as well as individuals desiring to obtain a driver's license whose primary care provider is a chiropractor, or who otherwise desire to have the physical examination required to obtain a driver's license conducted by a chiropractor.

#### § 75.6. Physical examination.

An applicant for a driver's license, who has never been issued a driver's license in this Commonwealth or another state, shall submit to a physical examination <u>performed</u> by a licensed physician, [or] <u>a CRNP</u>, [or] a physician assistant <u>or a chiropractor</u>. The licensed physician, [or] CRNP, [or] physician assistant <u>or chiropractor</u> performing the examination shall report the findings of the physical examination to the Department on a
