The regulation raises the biennial renewal fees for professional engineers, professional land surveyors and professional geologists from \$25 to \$50; deletes the schedule of examination fees for all three licensure classes; and adds language explaining how examination fees are established and collected. The regulation also makes editorial changes.

Section 9 of the Engineer, Land Surveyor and Geologist Registration Law (Registration Law), 63 P.S. §156, authorizes the Board to establish fees as are necessary to generate sufficient revenues for the Board's operations. Section 4(e) of the Registration Law (63 P.S. §151(e)) contemplates that the Board may assess biennial renewal fees by regulation.					

Regulatory Analysis Form

(10) Is the regulation mandated by any federal or state law or court order, or federal regulation? If yes, cite the specific law, case or regulation, and any deadlines for action.

Section 9 of the Registration Law mandates that the Board establish fees by regulation.

(11) Explain the compelling public interest that justifies the regulation. What is the problem it addresses?

Section 9 of the Registration Law requires the Board to generate adequate revenues through fees to meet its expenses over a biennial period. Biennial renewal fees account for approximately 77% of the Board's biennial revenues from fees. Biennial renewal revenues defray general operating expenses and overhead that cannot be apportioned to specific segments of the regulated community. The current biennial renewal fees are inadequate to meet the Board's revenue requirements. According to the Department of State's Bureau of Finance and Operations (BFO), the Board will incur large deficits over the next several fiscal years — resulting in a cumulative deficit of approximately \$652,640 by the end of FY06-07 — unless the new biennial renewal fees are adopted. The new biennial renewal fees will allow the Board to enjoy positive revenue balances for the foreseeable future.

Deletion of the examination fees furthers the goal of Governor's Executive Order 1996-1 (relating to regulatory review and promulgation) by eliminating unnecessary regulations. The examination fees are not appropriate for regulations because they are established by contract between the Commonwealth and the independent testing organizations that develop, administer and grade the Board's examinations. The regulation provides an explanation of how examination fees are established and how they are collected.

(12) State the public health, safety, environmental or general welfare risks associated with nonregulation.

The principal risk associated with nonregulation is that a significant portion of the Board's expenses would be subsidized by revenues from other licensing boards within the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, thereby frustrating the legislative requirement that each licensing board achieve fiscal self-sufficiency through the support of its regulated community.

(13) Describe who will benefit from the regulation. (Quantify the benefits as completely as possible and approximate the number of people who will benefit.)

The regulation benefits the Board's regulated community and the public at large by ensuring that the Board has adequate revenues to discharge its duties under the Registration Law.

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(14) Describe who will be adversely affected by the regulation. (Quantify the adverse effects as completely as possible and approximate the number of people who will be adversely affected.)

The Board cannot identify any group that will be adversely affected by the regulation.

(15) List the persons, groups or entities that will be required to comply with the regulation. (Approximate the number of people who will be required to comply.)

Professional engineers, professional land surveyors and professional geologists will be required to pay the new biennial renewal fees. The Board estimates that approximately 32,355 professional engineers, 3,413 professional land surveyors and 2,637 professional geologists will renew their registrations for the biennial renewal period that begins October 1, 2005.

(16) Describe the communications with and input from the public in the development and drafting of the regulation. List the persons and/or groups who were involved, if applicable.

Because the need for the regulation is based on a fiscal analysis conducted by the BFO using a standardized methodology, the Board did not believe that input from the public or the regulated community at the drafting stage of the regulation would have been helpful in the drafting of proposed rulemaking.

(17) Provide a specific estimate of the costs and/or savings to the regulated community associated with compliance, including any legal, accounting or consulting procedures which may be required.

The Board estimates that approximately 38,405 licensees will pay the new biennial renewal fees established by the regulation. The Board estimates that the total additional cost to the regulated community during each biennial renewal period will be approximately \$960,125.

The regulation will not impose new legal, accounting or consulting procedures.

The regulation will take effect upon final publication in the <u>Pennsylvania Bulletin</u> , and will apply to the biennial renewal period that begins October 1, 2005.

The Board reviews its revenues and program costs on a fiscal year and biennial basis.
During review of the regulation on proposed rulemaking, the House Professional Licensure Committee and the Independent Regulatory Review Commission recommended that the Board amend §37.16 (relating to general information; application and examination). An exposure draft of proposed amendments to §37.16 is attached as Exhibit 2. It is anticipated that the proposed

amendments, which are part of a comprehensive updating and revision of the Board's entire chapter

of regulations, will be submitted for proposed rulemaking by early 2006.

- [(b) Reexaminee applications. An approved application shall entitle the applicant to take the written examination once upon payment of one fee. If the applicant fails the examination, the applicant shall submit a reexaminee application and pay a new fee. Additional references or experience information, or both, on a candidate may be requested in writing by the Board for purposes of updating the applicant's file.
- (c) Examinations. Written examinations will be held in Pittsburgh, Harrisburg, Philadelphia and other places designated by the Board during the months of April and October of each year at sites designated. Applications for examination eligibility shall be submitted to the Board office by December 1 for the April examination and by July 1 for the October examination.]

FINAL RULEMAKING

COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA DEPARTMENT OF STATE BUREAU OF PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL AFFAIRS STATE REGISTRATION BOARD FOR PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERS, LAND SURVEYORS AND GEOLOGISTS (49 PA. CODE, CHAPTER 37)

BIENNIAL RENEWAL FEES AND EXAMINATION FEES

PREAMBLE

The State Registration Board for Professional Engineers, Land Surveyors and Geologists (Board), by this order, amends §37.17 (relating to schedule of fees) to read as set forth in Annex A.

The amendments raise the biennial renewal fees for professional engineers, professional land surveyors and professional geologists from \$25 to \$50. The new biennial renewal fees will initially apply to licensees who renew their biennial registrations for the renewal period that begins October 1, 2005. The amendments also delete examination fees from the Board's fee schedule and add an explanatory statement about how examination fees are set and collected. The amendments also make minor editorial changes to the descriptions of certain fees for consistency of usage.

Summary of Comments and Responses to Proposed Rulemaking

The Board published a notice of proposed rule making at 35 Pa.B.258 (January 8, 2005), with a 30-day public comment period. The proposed rulemaking explained in detail the fiscal and policy reasons for amending the Board's fee schedule. The Board did not receive any public comments.

The Board received comments from the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the House Professional Licensure Committee (House Committee) as part of their review of proposed rulemaking under the Regulatory Review Act (63 P.S. §§745.1 - 745.14). The Board did not receive comments from the Senate Committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure (Senate Committee) as part of its review of proposed rulemaking under the Regulatory Review Act.

The amendments, in proposed form, provided for the deletion of examination fees from the Board's fee schedule, but did not add an explanatory statement about examination fees. The House Committee and IRRC recommended that language be added to the fee schedule explaining how examination fees are set and collected. The Board agrees that such clarification would be useful. The Board has incorporated into the final amendments a statement that examination fees are established by agreement between the Commonwealth and the testing organizations that develop, administer and grade the examinations and that examination candidates pay examination fees directly to the testing organizations.

The House Committee and IRRC also recommended that the Board consider amending §37.16 (relating to general information; application and examination). Section 37.16(c) provides that examinations are to be held in Pittsburgh, Harrisburg, Philadelphia and other places designated by the Board during the months of April and October of each year. Section 37.16(c) further provides that applications for examination eligibility are to be submitted to the Board by December 1 for the April examination and by July 1 for the October examination.

The House Committee questioned whether §37.16(c) should be revised, given that the testing organizations administer the examinations. IRRC likewise requested clarification, recommending that the Board replace the current §37.16(c) with language indicating where examination candidates can obtain information about current testing organizations, examination fees, examination deadlines, examination dates, and examination locations. IRRC also noted that the information in §37.16(c) is outdated with regard to the application deadlines for the professional geologist examination.

The Board agrees with the House Committee and IRRC that §37.16(c) should be amended. The Board is in the process of updating and revising its entire set of regulations in Chapter 37. The Board recently sent an exposure draft of the general revisions to professional organizations for pre-proposal comment. The proposed revisions to §37.16, as reflected in the exposure draft, would include language similar to that recommended by IRRC. Examination candidates would be directed to contact the testing organizations for examination applications and examination-related information, including examination fees, examination dates and locations, and examination application filing deadlines. Examination candidates would be advised that contact information about testing organizations may be obtained from the Board's website. The Board anticipates that the proposed general revisions will be published for public comment and submitted for regulatory review by early 2006.

Fiscal Impact

The amendments will generate approximately \$960,125 in additional biennial renewal fee revenues, broken down as follows:

Paperwork Requirements

The amendments will require the Board to change its biennial renewal form to reflect the new fees. The amendments will not create additional paperwork requirements for the regulated community.

Effective Date

The amendments will become effective upon publication of this final rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The new biennial renewal fees will initially apply to licensees who renew their registrations for the biennial renewal period beginning October 1, 2005.

Statutory Authority

Section 9 of the Engineer, Land Surveyor and Geologist Registration Law (Registration Law) (63 P.S. §156) requires the Board to establish fees by regulation and to ensure that revenues derived from fees, fines and civil penalties are adequate to cover the Board's expenditures over a biennial period. Section 4(e) of the Registration Law (63 P.S. §151(e)) contemplates that the Board may assess biennial renewal fees by regulation.

The Board considers the amendments to be both required by law and the least restrictive means of covering the cost of activities that the Board is required to perform.

Regulatory Review

On December 22, 2004, under authority of Section 5(a) and (f) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. §745.5(a) and (f)), the Board submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking published at 35 Pa. B. 258 to IRRC for review and comment. On February 2, 2005, under authority of Section 5(a) and (f) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Board submitted copies of the notice of proposed rulemaking published at 35 Pa. B. 258 to the chairpersons of the House and Senate Committees for review and comment.

In adopting final amendments, the Board considered comments from IRRC and the House Committee. The Board did not receive comments from the Senate Committee or the general public

Findings

The Board finds that:

- (1) Public notice of the Board's intention to amend 49 Pa. Code, Chapter 37, by this order has been given under Sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L.769, No. 240) (45 P.S. §§1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§7.1 and 7.2.
- (2) A public comment period was provided as required by law and all comments were considered.
- (3) The final-form rulemaking adopted by this order is necessary and appropriate for the administration of the Registration Law.
- (4) The amendments to this final-form rulemaking do not enlarge the original purpose of the proposed rulemaking at 35 Pa. B. 258.

Order

The Board, acting under the Registration Law, orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Board, 49 Pa. Code, Chapter 37, are amended by amending §37.17 to read as set forth in Annex A.
- (b) The Board shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General and the Office of General Counsel for approval as required by law.
- (c) The Board shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
 - (d) The amendments shall take effect upon publication in the <u>Pennsylvania Bulletin</u>.

STATE REGISTRATION BOARD FOR PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERS, LAND SURVEYORS AND GEOLOGISTS

[49 PA. CODE CH. 37]
Biennial Renewal Fees and Examination Fees

The State Registration Board for Professional Engineers, Land Surveyors and Geologists (Board) proposes to amend § 37.17 (relating to fees) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Description of Proposed Rulemaking

Section 37.17 sets forth a schedule of fees charged by the Board. The proposed rulemaking would raise the biennial renewal fees for professional engineers, professional land surveyors and professional geologists from \$25 to \$50; delete the examination fees for all three license classes; and make minor editorial changes.

Background and Need for Proposed Rulemaking

a. New Biennial Renewal Fees

Section 9 of the Engineer, Land Surveyor and Geologist Registration Law (Registration Law) (63 P.S. § 156)

provides that the Board's biennial revenues from fees, fines and civil penalties shall meet or exceed the Board's biennial expenditures. Because fines and civil penalties have historically accounted for a small percentage of the Board's total revenues, the Board must generate most of its revenues from fees.

The Board's principal sources of fee revenues are the fees charged to licensees for biennial renewal of their registrations. The biennial renewal fees account for approximately 77% of the Board's fee revenues during each biennial renewal period. The biennial renewal fees defray general operating expenses and overhead —primarily in the areas of investigation, prosecution and enforcement—that are not susceptible of being apportioned to a specific segment of persons and entities regulated by the Board and, therefore, are borne equally by the entire regulated community.

The current \$25 biennial renewal fees for professional engineers and professional land surveyors were established in 1978 by section 101 of the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs Fee Act (63 P. S. § 1401-101). The current \$25 biennial renewal fee for professional geologists was adopted in 1994.

A recent analysis prepared by the Department of State's Bureau of Finance and Operations (BFO) determined that the Board's current biennial renewal fee structure is inadequate to meet the Board's revenue needs. As reflected by the following revenue and expense data and projections provided by the BFO, the Board will continue to run large deficits unless the biennial renewal fees are increased:

To close the gap between the Board's revenues and expenses, the BFO recommended that the Board increase the biennial renewal fees for all three licensure classes from \$25 to \$50, effective with the biennial renewal period that begins October 1, 2005. The higher biennial renewal fees would raise biennial renewal revenues from the current to \$960,125.00 to \$1,920,250. The BFO estimates that these additional biennial revenues would enable the Board to have positive balances for the foreseeable future, including approximately \$815,861.32 at the end of FY08-09.

b. Deletion of Examination Fees

The examinations for certification as an engineer-intraining and surveyor-in-training and for licensure as a professional engineer, professional land surveyor and professional geologist are developed, administered and graded by independent testing organizations under contract with the Commonwealth. The Board has no role in establishing examination fees. Examination fees are established by contract between the independent testing organizations and the Commonwealth and are remitted by examination candidates directly to those organizations. The Board proposes to discontinue the practice of periodically amending its regulations to publish updated schedules of examination fees. Accordingly, the proposed rulemaking would delete all references to examination fees. The Board would continue to provide current examination fee information to examination candidates on its website.

c. Editorial Changes

The proposed rulemaking would make minor editorial changes to descriptions of the fees for consistency of usage in the fee schedule.

Fiscal Impact

The proposed rulemaking would generate approximately \$960,125 in additional biennial renewal fee revenues, broken down as follows:

Paperwork Requirements

The proposed rulemaking would require the Board to change its biennial renewal form to reflect the new fees. The proposed rulemaking would not create additional paperwork requirements for the regulated community. Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking would become effective upon publication of the final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The new biennial renewal fees would apply to licensees who renew their registrations for the biennial renewal period beginning October 1, 2005.

Statutory Authority

Section 9 of the Registration Law requires the Board to establish fees by regulation and to ensure that revenues derived from fees, fines and civil penalties are adequate to cover the Board's expenditures over a biennial period. Section 4(e) of the Registration Law (63 P. S. § 151(e)) contemplates that the Board may assess biennial renewal fees by regulation.

The Board considers the proposed rulemaking to be both required by law and the least restrictive means of covering the cost of activities that the Board is required to perform.

Regulatory Review

On December 22, 2004, under authority of section 5(a) and (f) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a) and (f)), the Board submitted copies of this proposed rulemaking, a Regulatory Analysis Form and a Fee Report Form to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC). Copies of the Regulatory Analysis and Fee Report Forms are available to the public upon regulatory.

In accordance with section 5(a) and (f) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Board will deliver copies of this proposed rulemaking and the Regulatory Analysis and Fee Report Forms to the Chairpersons of the Senate Standing Committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure and the House Standing Committee on Professional Licensure by the second Monday after the date on which committee designations for the 2005-2006 session of the General Assembly are published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed rulemaking within 30 days after the close of

the public comment period, specifying the regulatory review criteria that have not been met. The Regulatory Review Act sets forth procedures that permit the Board, the General Assembly and the Governor to review IRRC's comments, recommendations or objections prior to final adoption of the proposed rulemaking.
