I am a first year physician assistant student currently attending Philadelphia University's Master of Science in Physician Assistant Studies Program in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. I am writing in support of the proposed changes to Pennsylvania Code Title 49, Chapter 18, relating to physician assistants. It is paramount that you hear the voices of current PA students across the state of Pennsylvania. The proposed changes will update the regulation of my future profession and allow me to care for patients more effectively.

As you are well aware, the proposed regulations have previously been approved by the medical board. They now are facing the next step in the process: review by the legislature, public comment, and final review by the medical board. While the proposed changes are numerous, they boil down to a moderate update of PA regulation in Pennsylvania. They will streamline but not diminish supervision and allow physicians to make the best use of their PAs.
