The grade configurations identified in the proposed regulations for certification are not reflective of the

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majority of school district/building configurations which makes no sense. The division will cause significant staffing problems in small districts as they become staffed with teachers holding the k-3 and 4-8 certificates. Small districts are often impacted with temporary population shifts affecting the numbers of sections in a particular grade. As these population changes move through a school there may become cause to need more teachers with one certificate and fewer of the other. This will result in need to furlough some staff and hire others. as the population shift then changes it will again impact what teachers are needed and what certificates they will need.

The 4-8 certificate will not solve the problems of middle schools reflective of both meeting the needs of increasing achievement expectations and highly qualified issues under NCLB.

Much more thought must be given to the regulations to enable the placement of quality professional employees in positions to have the greatest positive impact on student achievement. Sincerely
