To Whom It May Concern:

I am writing concerning Chapter 49-2 which is now in the Public Comment period. In reviewing the *Regulatory Analysis Form* I am especially concerned about the following:

How does this regulation compare with those of other states? Will the regulation put Pennsylvania at a competitive disadvantage with other states?

I believe that Chapter 49-2 will put Pennsylvania (and its teacher education graduates) at a <u>distinct competitive disadvantage</u> with other states. It will discourage potential teacher candidates from enrolling in Pennsylvania teacher preparation programs and it will make graduates of Pennsylvania teacher less employable in other states.

Currently PA graduates about twice as many elementary certified teachers as are employed each year in PA. Many of these PA graduates seek employment in states, especially on the east coast of the United States. Often they return to PA after they have gained teaching experience and earned advanced degrees. Teacher education is a very strong positive economic force in PA. PA is sixth in the nation in the number of teachers prepared. If our graduates are less employable in other states, it will discourage enrollment in teacher preparation institutions in this state.

States on the eastern seaboard (see **BOLD** in Table A) with the exception of Georgia, have a K-6 (or very similar) general elementary certification in addition to the Early Childhood certification and the Middle School

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certification. In the changes proposed by Chapter 49-2 there will be no general elementary certification in Pennsylvania. This will limit the portability of PA certified elementary teachers.
