I am writing to support Section 14.105 Personnel section of the Chapter 14 - Special Education Services and Programs. I believe that a paraprofessional should have (1) at least 2 years of secondary study and (2) Possess an Associate Degree and that this should be implemented. I would also like to see those paraprofessional who were hired before July 1, 2008 be required to take the courses necessary to obtain an Associates Degree.

In my nine years of experience with our school system, being a parent of an autistic son, I have found that most of the instructional aides, as well as many teachers are not trained to work with children with autism. I have also found that the training provided to the instructional aides is not nearly enough to help them understand the disability, to train them to work with our children and to provide positive behavior techniques during the school day. I also find it unbelievable that regular education teachers are not required to take courses which would help them work with our children.
