As a current physician assistant graduate student at Gannon University in Erie, Pennsylvania, I believe the ability for physician assistants to prescribe in osteopathic medicine would benefit both parties.

Prescription privileges for physician assistants would be valuable to osteopathic physicians because more practices would hire physician assistants, which will reduce the work load of the physician. The ability of the physician assistant to prescribe would reduce waiting times, increase the availability of appointments, and allow the physician to devote more time to more significant issues. The osteopathic physician will be more beneficial to patients, hospitals, and practices with the ability to supervise physician assistants who are authorized to write prescriptions.

Physician assistants would profit from prescription privileges with the opportunity for more job openings, especially in Pennsylvania.
