I am a Physician Assistant student at Gannon University in Erie, Pennsylvania. Our staff provides an unrivaled curriculum that fully prepares us students to write prescriptions under MDs and DOs alike. Physician Assistants have been awarded prescription privileges by MDs in Pennsylvania for years due to the fact that the training is more than adequate, and the supervision provided by the allopaths ensures safety and efficacy. By not allowing Physician Assistants in Pennsylvania to write prescriptions, Doctors of Osteopathic medicine are causing themselves a great disadvantage; if Physician Assistants they supervised could provide the full extent of their knowledge and abilities, reduced patient load would thus open more spaces for patients.
