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NDEPENDENT REGULATORY REVIEW COMMISSION

I am writing due to the recent review of possibly allowing osteopathic physicians to delegate prescriptions to Physician Assistants they supervise. There are a number of reasons I support the decision. First off, I am an undergraduate PA major attending Gannon University and have every intention of completing my college curriculum and become a practicing PA or PA-C. As of right now, PA's are able to prescribe under an allopathic physician which appears to be helping out the world of medicine on so many different levels. To help myself afford college, I waitress in downtown Erie where so many customers ask me what I'm going to school for and I tell them. About 80% know what a PA is and what a PA does and have encountered one while at a physician's office and I've only heard good things.
