Upon being a fourth year physician assistant student at Duquesne University, I am becoming more aware of the politics that surround management in medicine. One of the hot topics currently under fire is the idea that physician assistants do not have the authority to prescribe medicine under D.O. physicians. This is a very important issue, both to D.O.'s and Physician Assistant because it raises questions as to why we are able to prescribe under Medical Doctors if not Osteopathic Doctors.
