| The purpose of these amendments is to update the minimum medical requirements and standards for drivers with diabetes mellitus, which includes new medical terms and categories, new physician reporting requirements and a waiver of disqualification for drivers who have experienced temporary or isolated episodes that may otherwise disqualify them from driving; to add chiropractors to the list of individuals permitted to administer physical examinations required for licensure; and, to amend the term "CRNP—Certified registered nurse practitioner" to reflect changes in the certification process. | | | | | |

These amendments to the regulation are not mandated by any federal or state law or court order or federal regulations.

(11) Explain the compelling public interest that justifies the regulation. What is the problem it addresses?

Advances in the practice of medicine and in medical research have caused medical providers to reevaluate the risk to the public safety posed by drivers diagnosed with diabetes mellitus, including the most severe manifestations of the disease caused by hypoglycemia and hyperglycemia. Medical advances have improved disease management and improved testing to ensure that in all but rare cases, the disease is controlled or otherwise not an impediment to the safe operation of a motor vehicle. By recognizing medical advancements, requiring drivers to provide certain test results to the Department and providing a waiver to drivers who experienced temporary or isolated episodes that would otherwise prohibit operation of a motor vehicle, these amendments will permit individuals heretofore prohibited from driving to obtain a driver's license, without risk to the safety of the motoring public.

(12) State the public health, safety, environmental or general welfare risks associated with non-regulation.

Failure to amend these regulations will continue to prohibit individuals who are capable of operating a motor vehicle safely from obtaining a driver's license.

(13) Describe who will benefit from the regulation. (Quantify the benefits as completely as possible and approximate the number of people who will benefit.)

Individuals with diabetes mellitus controlled by medication or appropriate disease management techniques will benefit from clear medical standards that will not restrict their ability to operate a motor vehicle, except in rare circumstances where a drivers' motor vehicle operation would pose a threat to public safety. Individuals with diabetes mellitus, along with those who may have had past episodes that would have otherwise prohibited operation of a motor vehicle, but who are nevertheless able to safely drive, will also benefit from the more current medical standards in the amendments to the regulation and its waiver provisions. Additionally, consumers will benefit from having the additional choice of a chiropractor, as a health care provider qualified to conduct physical examinations prior to obtaining a driver license. The precise number of individuals who will benefit cannot be determined.

(14) Describe who will be adversely affected by the regulation. (Quantify the adverse effects as completely as possible and approximate the number of people who will be adversely affected.)

There should be no adverse impact on any individuals from these amendments to the regulation. Individuals with severe forms of diabetes mellitus will be prohibited from operating a motor vehicle; this inconvenience, however, is easily outweighed by the grant of driving privileges to a broader group of persons with diabetes mellitus and the overall safety of the motoring public.

Health care providers may be adversely affected by the loss of revenue resulting from the addition of chiropractors to the list of health care providers who can conduct physical examinations prior to licensure. The precise number of individuals affected cannot be determined.

(15) List the persons, groups or entities that will be required to comply with the regulation. (Approximate the number of people who will be required to comply.)

It is not known precisely how many individuals with diabetes mellitus will be required to comply with these regulations. The number of regulated persons should decrease from present levels of regulation, as certain individuals who, without these amendments are not permitted to drive at all, will now be permitted to drive. Additionally, health care providers will be required to comply with the reporting requirements of these regulations.

(16) Describe the communications with and input from the public in the development and drafting of the regulation. List the persons and/or groups who were involved, if applicable.

The proposed regulatory changes were discussed during three Medical Advisory Board meetings and approved. These public meetings were attended by representatives from the Pennsylvania Medical Society and the Pennsylvania Osteopathic Medical Association. The proposed regulations were also shared with the American Diabetic Association.

(17) Provide a specific estimate of the costs and/or savings to the regulated community associated with compliance, including any legal, accounting or consulting procedures which may be required.

The costs and/or savings to the regulated community resulting from these amendments are marginal and cannot be calculated with any precision.

There should be no costs and/or savings to local governments resulting from these amendments to the regulation.

Reporting requirements included in § 83.5 of these amendments are not new but are required by 75 Pa. C.S. § 1518. These amendments alter the reporting requirement somewhat by making it clear in § 83.5(a)(1)(B) that a waiver from disqualification is available by written certification from a treating physician that an otherwise disqualifying episode is a temporary

condition or isolated incident not likely to recur.

(29) Please list any special provisions which have been developed to meet the particular needs of affected groups or persons including, but not limited to, minorities, elderly, small businesses, and farmers.

These amendments are all designed to meet the particular needs of individuals with some physical or mental limitation.

These amendments will become effective upon publication in final form in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Preamble

Notice is hereby given that the Department of Transportation, pursuant to the authority contained in Sections 1517, 1518, and 6103 of the Vehicle Code, Act of June 17, 1976, P.L. 162, No. 81, as amended (75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1517, 1518, and 6103), proposes to amend Chapter 83 of the Department of Transportation Regulations, Title 67, by amending §§ 83.1, 83.2, and 83.5, as set forth in Annex A to this Notice.

Purpose of Chapter

The purpose of Chapter 83 is to set forth physical and mental criteria, including vision standards, for the licensing of drivers, formulated by the Medical Advisory Board pursuant to Sections 1517 and 1518 of the Vehicle Code (75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1517 and 1518). In addition to their use by the Department in connection with its responsibilities under the Vehicle Code, these physical and mental criteria are to be used by medical providers in conducting physical examinations of applicants for learner permits and driver licenses, and by physicians and other persons authorized to diagnose and treat disorders and disabilities covered in Chapter 83 to determine whether a person should be reported to the Department as having a disorder affecting the ability of the person to drive safely.

Purpose of the Proposed Amendments

The purpose of these amendments to Chapter 83 is to update the medical requirements and standards for license holders that are being treated for diabetes mellitus. Diabetes management and testing continues to evolve. These amendments update minimum standards to ensure that only drivers who are not at risk of suffering from severe hypoglycemia reactions, hypoglycemia unawareness or symptomatic hyperglycemia are licensed to operate a motor vehicle.

These regulations reflect consultation with the Department's Medical Advisory Board, as required by 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1517 and 1518. The Medical Advisory Board, after having conducted in-depth reviews and discussions, has determined that these regulations require amendment to make them consistent with existing medical practice and improved technology.

Summary of Significant Amendments

Section 83.1 (Purpose) has been amended to add chiropractors to the list of individuals that are permitted to administer the physical examination required for the issuance of a driver's license, as required by Act 756 of 2004.

Section 83.2 (Definitions) has been amended to add the term "chiropractor" to the regulation as required by Section 1508.1(a) of the PA Vehicle code and also to correct the term "CRNP – Certified registered nurse practitioner". This certification is obtained solely by the State Board of Nursing; the State Board of Medicine is no longer involved.

The amendments also add the terms "HbA1C", "Hyperglycemia", "Hypoglycemia", "Symptomatic Hyperglycemia", "Type I Diabetes mellitus" and "Type

II Diabetes mellitus". In addition, "Hypoglycemia reactions" has been categorized by

different degrees of severity. These additions reflect current guidelines established by the

American Diabetes Association.

Section 83.2 has been amended to include the categories of hypoglycemic

reactions established by the American Diabetes Association. This section also is

amended to add the requirement for drivers to submit the results of a HbA1C and a vision

screening.

In addition, the amendments add a waiver provision for individuals who have

experienced an episode that would disqualify them from driving if the episode was as a

result of a nonrecurring transient illness, toxic ingestion or metabolic imbalance as long

as the treating physician verifies that it is a temporary condition or isolated incident not

likely to recur.

Persons and Entities Affected

These regulations affect all persons qualified or desiring to be qualified to drive

and health care providers.

Fiscal Impact

Implementation of these regulations will not require the expenditure of any

additional funds by the Commonwealth or local municipalities. These regulations will

not impose any additional costs on the medical community and may reduce costs by

providing clearer medical criteria and thus reduce unnecessary reporting by physicians

and the need for follow-up medical examinations for drivers. These amendments do not

impose any additional medical examinations that are not customary for diabetic care.

Regulatory Review

Under Section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Act of June 25, 1982 (P.L. 633, No. 181), as amended, 71 P.S. § 745.5(a), the agency submitted a copy of these proposed regulations, on June 18, 2008 to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission and to the Chairpersons of the House and Senate Transportation Committees. In addition to submitting the regulations, the agency has provided the Commission and the Committees with a copy of a detailed Regulatory Analysis Form. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under Section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey any comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed regulations within 30 days of the close of the public comment period. The comments, recommendations or objections shall specify the regulatory review criteria that have not been met. The Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the regulation, by the Department, the General Assembly and the Governor of comments recommendation, or objections.

Sunset Provisions

The Department of Transportation will make these regulations effective upon publication in final form following appropriate evaluation of any comments, suggestions or objections received during the period allowed for public comment. The Department is not establishing a sunset date for these regulations, since these regulations are needed to administer provisions required pursuant to the Vehicle Code (75 Pa. C.S. 1.01, et seq.).

The Department, however, will continue to closely monitor these regulations for their effectiveness.

Notice of Proposed Rulemaking

§ 83.1. Purpose.

Section 1517(b) of the act (relating to medical advisory board) authorizes the Department to adopt physical and mental criteria, including vision standards, for licensing of drivers under Chapter 15 of the act (relating to licensing of drivers). These physical and mental criteria have been formulated by the Medical Advisory Board under the authority of sections 1517 and 1518 of the act (relating to medical advisory board and reports on mental or physical disabilities or disorders). In addition to their use by the Department in connection with its responsibilities under Chapter 15 of the act, these physical and mental criteria shall be used by physicians, chiropractors, CRNPs and physician assistants in conducting physical examinations of applicants for learner's permits and driver's licenses and by physicians and other persons authorized to diagnose and treat disorders and disabilities covered in this chapter in determining whether a person examined by the provider should be reported to the Department as having a disorder affecting the ability of the person to drive safely.

§ 83.2. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

<u>Chiropractor—A practitioner of chiropractic as defined in 75 Pa.C.S.</u>

§ 1508.1(b) (relating to physical examinations).

CRNP—Certified registered nurse practitioner—A registered nurse licensed in this Commonwealth who is certified[,] by [both] the State Board of Nursing [and the State Board of Medicine,] in a particular clinical specialty area and who, while functioning in the expanded role as a professional nurse, performs acts of medical diagnosis or prescription of medical therapeutic or corrective measures in collaboration with and under the direction of a physician licensed to practice medicine in this Commonwealth.

<u>HbA1C test</u> – A Hemoglobin A1C test monitors the long-term control of diabetes mellitus.

<u>Hyperglycemia</u> – When the level of glucose (sugar) in the blood is too high based on current guidelines established by the American Diabetes Association.

<u>Hypoglycemia</u> – When the level of glucose (sugar) in the blood is too low based on current guidelines established by the American Diabetes Association.

<u>Hypoglycemic Reactions</u> – Different degrees of hypoglycemia which are classified as follows:

Mild – Hypoglycemia that signals a blood glucose drop, which the individual can self correct with oral carbohydrates.

Severe – Hypoglycemia that requires outside intervention and/or assistance of others or that produces confusion, loss of attention or a loss of consciousness.

Hypoglycemia Unawareness – A condition when the individual no longer recognizes the body's usual signals of low blood glucose so the first sign of hypoglycemia will often be confusion or loss of consciousness.

Symptomatic Hyperglycemia – High glucose levels in the blood that may cause a loss of consciousness or an altered state of perception, including but not limited to decreased reaction time, impaired vision and/or hearing, and confusion.

Type I Diabetes mellitus— A chronic disease caused by the pancreas producing too little insulin to regulate blood sugar levels.

Type II Diabetes mellitus—A chronic disease marked by high levels of sugar in the blood caused by the body failing to respond correctly to natural insulin.

§ 83.5. Other physical and medical standards.

(a) General disqualifications. A person who has any of the following conditions will not be qualified to drive:

(1) Unstable [or brittle] diabetes <u>mellitus</u> [or] <u>leading to severe</u>
hypoglycemi[a]c reactions, hypoglycemic unawareness or symptomatic
hyperglycemia, unless there has been a continuous period of at least 6 months
free[dom] from an above listed disqualification. Individuals must submit results
of a HbA1C and vision screening as outlined in the table below.

(B) A waiver may be granted if an individual has been previously free from severe hypoglycemic reactions, hypoglycemia unawareness or symptomatic hyperglycemia for the preceding 6 months and the subsequent severe hypoglycemic reaction, hypoglycemia unawareness or symptomatic hyperglycemia occurred while the individual was under the treating physician's care, during or concurrent with a nonrecurring transient illness, toxic ingestion or metabolic imbalance. The above waiver will only be granted if the treating physician submits written certification indicating it is a temporary condition or isolated incident not likely to recur.
