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INDEPENDENT REGULATORY REVIEW COMMISSION

Dear Chairman Coccodrilli,

As a concerned dog breeder, I am writing this letter to ask that you consider voting against the proposed legislation contained within 7PA Code Chapter 28A concerning the mandating of kennel conditions because I believe that these standards are detrimental to our industry. Research has shown that some of the mandates will make it illegal for breeders to keep the puppy's body core temperature above the needed 95 degrees Fahrenheit if kennels were to adhere to the requirements. As small business owners work so hard in this difficult economy, the requirements of this code will put undue stress on kennel owners and breeders and may very well put them out of business. We all strive to improve the quality of our industry, but I feel these proposed regulatory changes only advance the animal activists' true goal of making dog breeding so economical burdensome that breeders will be forced to close their kennels.

I believe that the Department of Agriculture has exceeded its statuary authority in mandating the requirements of this proposal. The Canine Health Board was given the task to develop regulations when the kennel's inside temperature rises above 85 degrees Fahrenheit, not to rewrite the statute using the theory of Heat Index making it illegal if the temperature rises above 80.4 degrees Fahrenheit. (80.3 degrees Fahrenheit x 100 % Relative Humidity = 90 (HI). The Department goes further to place a regulation that if the inside kennel temperature rises above 85 (F), the kennel owner must reduce the kennel Heat Index below 85. (79.5 (F) x 100 % Relative Humidity = 85 (HI).

Concerning the new heat index maximums and air flow minimum standards, veterinarian experts have concluded that these standards will in the death of most of our puppies. Puppies require temperatures higher than the regulations permit to sustain a puppy's life during their first weeks of life. Research shows that this proposal will be destructive and is not a plausible standard. Please consider carefully the requirements of this code.

OSHA regulations of ammonia levels for hospitals, restaurants, nursing homes, and schools are between 25 ppm and 50 ppm. The Canine Health Board proposed regulation set the maximum level at 15 ppm. None of the studies sited have any evidence of 16 ppm through 24 ppm having any ill effects on dogs. The Department has once again proposed a regulations that are excessive and attempts to set new unrealistic standards for raising animals.

The proposed regulations will mandate the complete air exchange rates that equal 15 to 30 times per hour. The amount of electricity and gas used for compliance of a kennel to the Canine Health Board's new proposed regulations will be enormous, as well as the cost to the breeder. The totality of these regulations only has one real goal... to put professional breeders' out-of-business! Please consider these negative repercussions of the passage of this bill and vote "No" against the proposed changes!
