11 From: Keith Yorks [kjebyorks@msn.com] Sent: Monday, January 04, 2010 7:08 AM 1978 - 141 - 81 - 1916 - 1916 EP, RegComments To: Subject: FW: Environmental Quality Board "outdoor wood furnance"comments NDEPENDENT RECUMICRY > Dear Environmental Quality Board, > > This past summer, I received a building permit to install an "outdoor wood burner > furnace" for the purpose of heating my first floor apartment residence and > hot water heater and my tenant's second floor hot water heater. > > With the proposed addition of an "outdoor wood burner furnace', I proceeded with > various upgrade purchases including a trailer, gas powered log splitter, > chain saw items and replaced my 1993 pick up truck. > I cut, split and delivered wood from property owned by relatives and myself. > I also cut and removed numerous trees, in exchange for the wood, for friends > who could not neither afford to pay a tree removal service nor had the > equipment and skill to do it themselves. > > The actual purchase and installation of my "outdoor wood burner furnace" has been > completed for approximately \$9,000.00 (excluding my own time, labor, and auxilary purchases). > > I've recently received a copy of the proposed changes regarding the usage > of outdoor wood furnaces in my home state of Pennsylvania. > > To my personal dismay, I am now aware that the proposed regulations unfairly > jeopardize my being able to continue using my "outdoor wood burner furnace" > 1. I "utilize free wood sources" that would normally be left to decay or > removal would cause a financial burden to property owners. > > 2. I've increased my usage of hot water for laundry, dishes and showers > (sanitary improvement) and raised my apartment temperature from 62 degrees > and I am still able to save electric and oil costs for my apartment and > reduce my tenant's electrical costs. > 3. My prior residence had a wood burning fireplace insert that created > concerns for chimney/structural fires, carbon monoxide, dust and ash issues > and extreme dry humidity. I do not have these issues because my wood burner > is physically separate from my duplex apartment building. > > Even though I have local "borough" approval the proposed state regulation > changes would not allow for me to continue using my "outdoor wood-fired > furnace." However, proposed regulations only deal with "outdoor wood burner > furnaces" and ignore the more inefficient indoor wood burner units, indoor > coal and various pellet wood burners, and open fireplaces already in > operation in my same local. > I believe it is totally unjust to set regulations to impose restrictive

> usage with the very probable outcome prohibiting usage of my existing

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> "outdoor wood burner furnace" considering that I have already purchased,

- > installed and operate my "outdoor wood burner furnace".
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- > I will support regulations requiring existing owners to comply with
- "reasonable fuel use requirements" and "reasonable" regulations regarding
  the installation of new "outdoor wood burner furnaces".
