We choose to go this way due to the increasing cost of home heating oil. We installed our wood stove to heat our house, swimming pool to have a longer season, hot water, and the plan of putting in a garage and with that said all of these items are heated off of our outdoor wood stove.

I believe that there should be no restrictions on when we can have our outdoor wood furnace operating. We currently live in a township on a more rural road. If people do not like our outdoor wood stove running during the summer time then they do not have to have there windows opened. We have our windows opened during the summer and winter months.
