- Excessive chimney height requirements for existing and new furnace installations.
- Seasonal prohibition between May 1 and September 30. A statewide seasonal restriction is for people that utilize the
- appliance for farming operations, greenhouse operations, or for domestic hot water is unreasonable.
- Opacity requirements for residential sized appliances because opacity is a subjective visual observation.

I am strongly opposed to the excessive and retroactive requirements of the proposed regulation. If passed as currently written, I believe that the regulation will adversely impact my rights and the rights of existing outdoor wood furnace owners that use there appliances in a responsible manner.
