RE: Comments on Docket No. L-2009-2107155, Rulemaking Re Amendment to 52 Pa. Code Sec. 59.18 Meter Location

Dear Commissioners:

The Preservation Alliance for Greater Philadelphia appreciates the opportunity to comment on proposed Revision of 52 Pa. Code § 59.18 Pertaining to Meter Set Location. Our organization is a nonprofit, membership organization whose mission is to promote the appreciation, protection and revitalization of the Philadelphia region's historic buildings, communities and landscapes. We appreciate the Commission's attempt to limit potential impacts to historic structures resulting from these proposed regulation changes governing the placement of gas meters and other equipment. However, we feel strongly that the proposed regulation, as currently written, would fail to sufficiently protect historic resources from adverse effects caused by inappropriate meter installation. The following are our primary concerns:

1) The proposed regulations give the utility provider sole jurisdiction in determining the placement of gas meter sets. Even where interior meters can be "considered" by utilities (i.e. in historic districts and high risk vandalism districts), there is no binding language in the regulations preventing exterior installations in these locations. We suggest that the word "considered" be replaced by the word "required."

2) The proposed exemption for historic properties at 59.18(c)(1)(i) reads in whole, "Inside meter locations shall be considered only when an acceptable outside location is not available due to restrictions in Federally approved Historic Districts or in high risk vandalism districts." This clause is vague and potentially ineffective in two ways. First, the term "Federally approved Historic Districts" is not a commonly understood designation and does not include significant numbers of individual properties certified as historic at the Federal level (through individual listing on the National Register of Historic Places), properties determined *eligible* for listing on the National Register, or properties certified as historic at the local level (either individually or as part of a local

historic district). These three classes of historic resources would be completely unprotected by the proposed exemption clause. Second, there are no Federal restrictions of any kind placed on properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Therefore, no property is technically "restricted" from alteration solely by virtue of its inclusion on the National Register, which under a strict interpretation would negate the applicability of this exemption clause entirely. We suggest the clause should read, "Inside meter locations shall be required when an acceptable outside location is not available on a property that, either individually or as part of a district, is listed or determined eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places, or has been designated as historic by the municipality."

3) In many historic districts and individual historic properties, especially dense rowhouse neighborhoods common in Philadelphia and other urban areas of the state, installation of a meter set on a building's primary exterior façade would be highly conspicuous, detract from its architectural integrity, and pose a pedestrian and vehicular safely hazard. The proposed regulations contain no language directing utility companies to locate meter sets on more appropriate secondary facades when such locations exist, regardless of an area's historic status. We suggest inclusion of language defining secondary facades as the preferred location for meter sets, regardless of historic designation.

4) Even in cases where interior gas meter installation is allowed, the proposed regulations still require the installation of an exterior regulator on historic properties. There is no language in the regulations which describes appropriate vs. inappropriate locations for this equipment, which has the potential to adversely affect a property's historic integrity. We suggest development of design guidelines for the appropriate location of meters and regulators.

5) The proposed regulations contain no provision for notifying property owners of the proposed new location of meter sets, nor provide an opportunity for owners to identify alternative locations or arrange for alternative utility services. We suggest a requirement that property owners receive 90-day written notice of proposed equipment relocation, including an illustration of proposed equipment and location of proposed installation.

The Preservation Alliance strongly urges the above revisions to the proposed regulations to better protect against adverse effects to the Commonwealth's important historic resources.

Thanks for alerting us to the proposed regulation requiring gas meters to be moved outside. While I support your comments, they do not go far enough. This is a problem not only for historic properties and districts, since most of Philadelphia's rowhouses and twins are not so designated. The effect of the regulations will be extremely ugly streetscapes throughout the city--the streetscapes are already marred by exterior meters that have been installed on new construction.

You say:

3) In many historic districts and individual historic properties, especially dense rowhouse neighborhoods common in Philadelphia and other urban areas of the state, installation of a meter set on a building's primary exterior façade would be highly conspicuous, detract from its architectural integrity, and pose a pedestrian and vehicular safely hazard. The proposed regulations contain no language directing utility companies to locate meter sets on more appropriate secondary facades when such locations exist, regardless of an area's historic status. We suggest inclusion of language defining secondary facades as the preferred location for meter sets, regardless of historic designation.

Can you make this comment stronger to REQUIRE use of a secondary facade (including rear facade in the case of a rowhouse)?

I support the Preservation Alliance position on New Gas Meter Regulations :

The Preservation Alliance has made the following recommendations for revision:

1) The proposed regulations give the utility provider sole jurisdiction in determining the placement of gas meter sets. Code § 59.18 pertaining to meter set location (Docket No. L-2009-2107155). I believe that, absent the Preservation Alliance's proposed changes, the historic integrity and visual character of Philadelphia and other communities across the state will be unnecessarily diminished by these new regulations.

I believe that the proposed exemption for historic properties in Section 59.18(c)(1)(i) should be tightened even further than that suggested by the Preservation Alliance. I suggest that the clause should read: "Inside meter locations shall be required when an acceptable outside location is not available <u>because the property is, either individually or as part of a district, listed or determined eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places, or has been designated as historic by the municipality.</u>" Without this important change, the reference to an "acceptable outside location" is still ambiguous and grants too much leeway to the utility provider to determine what is acceptable for a historic property.

As an owner of a historic home in Philadelphia and someone who has expended great effort and expense in preserving the historic integrity of my home, I am personally repulsed by the idea of slapping a crude gas meter on the façade and ruining the appearance of a home that has stood the test of time for over 170 years.
