As a tax-payer and resident of the great state of Pennsylvania, I am concerned about IRRC #2976 and its impact on the school districts and students of Pennsylvania. From your site: <<<Regulation #6 – 326: Academic Standards and Assessment

Amends existing regulations to reflect Pennsylvania's Common Core Standards in English language arts; address test security concerns; and require students to demonstrate proficiency on the Keystone Exams in order to graduate from high school.>>

Honestly, I do not understand why Pennsylvania has to amend Chapter 4 to conform to national standards. I believe there must be more transparency and public debate about the true cost of "this conformity".
