I was born and raised in Pennsylvania, and I support the establishment of the RGGI program to limit the emissions of carbon dioxide from fossil fuel-fired electric generating units in Pennsylvania. The program is a good compromise between economic and environmental priorities. Under RGGI, the participating states agree on a regional limit on the carbon pollution that power plants can emit. Each state creates its own program for implementing the agreement. Large carbon-emitting power plants purchase allowances equal to their CO2 emissions and can buy, sell, or trade carbon allowances within the overall cap. Power plants must pay for the dirty carbon pollution they cause, so they have an incentive to lower their emissions. If power plants reduce their emissions below their allowance, they can bank those allowances for use in the future, or sell allowances to other power plants, which creates more incentive for power plants to invest in ways to reduce their carbon emissions further. The purchase of the allowances generates funds – as high as \$300 million in a year – that could be used to support energy efficiency and renewable energy to further reduce air pollution in the state, and to help low-income consumers as well as communities that are transitioning away from fossil fuels.

Plus, RGGI is a multi-state, market-driven program for CO2 emissions from the electric power sector, implemented by a bipartisan group of governors. It stretches across 10 states from Maine to Maryland, with Virginia and Pennsylvania now getting on board. When we join, we'll be part of a team working together for a better future. Don't let Pennsylvania be left behind!
