I am currently the General Plant Superintendent of the Bailey Central Preparation Plant, in charge of the largest coal processing facility in the United States, if not in the world. I began working for Aloe Coal Company in the 1970's, and simultaneously attended Penn State University, graduating at the top of my class with a B.S. in Mining Engineering in 1982. I am of retirement age, so my comments are not meant to extend my career or improve my wages. My concern is that the next generations of energy workers will be displaced and our nation weakened because of an unproven THEORY that man can control the climate.

Anyone can look at the earth's geology and see that climate change is naturally occurring, that deserts and mountains were once covered with water, oceans rise and recede.
