As a Pa citizen, I have concerns about the proposed Integrated Standards for Science, Environment and Ecology at the secondary level and how they will impact current and future students in our state. I was alerted to the proposal by a good friend who is a retired, renowned PA public school science instructor. I agree with him that one does not improve standards by eliminating an entire category, particularly one that is of such vital importance not only to PA's students, but also in the global viewpoint. I am a retired PA English teacher, so I do know a thing or two about standards.

The proposed standards do not explicitly include Environment and Ecology as performance standards for grades 6-12. Secondary students must understand the importance of:

- watersheds and wetlands,
- biological diversity for environmental health,
- · our relationship to the environment,
- how ecosystems function and change over time.
- and proper management of threatened, endangered, and extinct species.

Furthermore, the proposed standards should include expectations for forming and evaluating views and need for action, planning and acting, and evaluating results. The performance standards should also include personal and civic responsibility expectations.

Quality environmental education begins with a foundation of understanding of our natural sciences and natural communities that include people. Natural science education must be ongoing and build on this fundamental building block in which each student understands Pennsylvania's ecosystems and the role of our natural community.

Our secondary students today are tomorrow's leaders and decision-makers for Pennsylvania. Pennsylvania's future environmental health, citizen well-being, and economic vitality depend on the knowledge available to our students now and for years to come.
