I recently watched the movie Dark Waters, and I can say the danger of PFOAs/PFAS to people and the environment are real and very scary. I'm glad that the DEP is considering new rules that would finally set maximum limits on two of the most common types of PFAS chemicals in public drinking water supplies. However, I believe the current proposal doesn't go nearly far enough, with studies showing the proposed new levels are still dangerous to human health. Additionally, dozens of harmful PFAS chemicals would be excluded from the rule, leaving Pennsylvania communities vulnerable to ongoing drinking water contamination.

I would like to see the proposal cover private systems, too, which are predominant in low-income, rural areas.

PFAS have been associated with developmental, immune, liver, and endocrine issues. They are also associated with increases in cholesterol, liver enzymes, and uric acid levels — as well as a decreased antibody response following vaccinations. These chemicals are persistent in the human body and throughout the environment. I understand that the risks are not fully understood, but we know enough to tell that these are dangerous chemicals.

I urge you to strengthen these standards to provide strict limits to all harmful PFAS chemicals

and regular testing to all water systems, no matter the size or whether public or private.
