<p>(7) Briefly explain the regulation in clear and nontechnical language. (100 words or less)</p> <p>This final-omitted rulemaking makes technical amendments to 22 Pa. Code Chapter 11 (Student Attendance) and 22 Pa. Code Chapter 12 (Students and Student Services) to conform relevant provisions within those Chapters with amendments to the definition of “compulsory school age” enacted by Act 16 of 2019. In that Act, the General Assembly lowered the age by which attendance in school is required from age 8 to age 6 and raised the age for compulsory attendance in school from 17 to 18. The rulemaking also corrects a typographical error in Chapter 12 as it is currently published.</p>		
<p>(8) State the statutory authority for the regulation. Include <u>specific</u> statutory citation.</p> <p>The State Board of Education (Board) is acting under the authority of Sections 2603-B(a) and 2604-B(b)(2)(v) of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P.S. §§ 26-2603-B(a) and 26-2604-B(b)(2)(v)). Through that authority, the Board seeks to conform provisions of its regulations that now are in conflict with the definition of “compulsory school age” in Section 1326 of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P.S. § 13-1326).</p>		
<p>(9) Is the regulation mandated by any federal or state law or court order, or federal regulation? Are there any relevant state or federal court decisions? If yes, cite the specific law, case or regulation as well as, any deadlines for action.</p>		

The regulation is not mandated by federal law, federal regulation, or court order. As noted above, the regulations are amended to conform with the definition of “compulsory school age” in Section 1326 of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P.S. § 13-1326) as that definition was amended by Act 16 of 2019.

(10) State why the regulation is needed. Explain the compelling public interest that justifies the regulation. Describe who will benefit from the regulation. Quantify the benefits as completely as possible and approximate the number of people who will benefit.

Provisions within the Board’s regulations (22 Pa. Code § 11.13 and 22 Pa. Code §§ 12.1 and 12.6) currently reference compulsory school age as beginning no later than age 8 and extending until age 17, unless a student has graduated from high school. Compulsory attendance based on entry to school by age 8 and attendance through at least age 17 ended with the academic year commencing after August 27, 2019. At that time, changes to the ages for compulsory attendance made by the General Assembly in Act 16 of 2019 took effect. Those changes lowered the age by which attendance in school is required to 6 and raised the age for compulsory attendance to 18, unless a student has graduated from high school. This regulation is needed to make provisions within Chapters 11 and 12 that reference dated requirements for compulsory school age consistent with the current definition of compulsory school age established in statute. Pennsylvania’s 1.7 million public school students and their parents or guardians, as well as the state’s 124,000 classroom teachers and 8,192 school administrators, will benefit from creating consistency across related statutes and regulations.

(11) Are there any provisions that are more stringent than federal standards? If yes, identify the specific provisions and the compelling Pennsylvania interest that demands stronger regulations.

No, there are no provisions that are more stringent than federal standards.

(12) How does this regulation compare with those of the other states? How will this affect Pennsylvania’s ability to compete with other states?

These amendments are necessary to conform existing regulations of the Board with amendments to the Public School Code of 1949 and will not put Pennsylvania at a competitive disadvantage with other states.

(13) Will the regulation affect any other regulations of the promulgating agency or other state agencies? If yes, explain and provide specific citations.

The regulation will not affect other regulations of either the promulgating agency or other state agencies. In final-form regulation #6-347, which was approved by the Independent Regulatory Review Commission on May 19, 2022, the Board made a parallel technical amendment to conform 22 Pa. Code

§ 4.21(a) (relating to Elementary Education: primary and intermediate levels) with the current definition of “compulsory school age” in the Public School Code of 1949.

(14) Describe the communications with and solicitation of input from the public, any advisory council/group, small businesses and groups representing small businesses in the development and drafting of the regulation. List the specific persons and/or groups who were involved. (“Small business” is defined in Section 3 of the Regulatory Review Act, Act 76 of 2012.)

The sole purpose of the rulemaking is to conform Chapters 11 and 12 with the definition of “compulsory school age” in Section 1326 of the Public School Code of 1949 and to correct a typographical error in the text of Chapter 12 as it is currently published. Therefore, the Board is amending Chapters 11 and 12 as a final-omitted rulemaking without a public comment period as consideration of alternative regulatory constructs would be inconsistent with the statute to which the regulations are being conformed.

(15) Identify the types and number of persons, businesses, small businesses (as defined in Section 3 of the Regulatory Review Act, Act 76 of 2012) and organizations which will be affected by the regulation. How are they affected?

The final-omitted regulation will affect Pennsylvania’s 1.7 million public school students and their parents or guardians, as well as the state’s 124,000 classroom teachers and 8,192 school administrators, by creating consistency between dated references to compulsory school age requirements in existing provisions of the Board’s regulations and a related current statute.

(16) List the persons, groups or entities, including small businesses, that will be required to comply with the regulation. Approximate the number that will be required to comply.

The final-omitted regulation should have no effect on compliance by students, parents, teachers, or school administrators. Amendments to compulsory school age requirements took effect with the academic year commencing after August 27, 2019, through the General Assembly’s adoption of Act 16 of 2019. The final-omitted rulemaking contains technical amendments to make related provisions in 22 Pa. Code Chapters 11 and 12 consistent with statutory requirements that already are in effect.

(17) Identify the financial, economic and social impact of the regulation on individuals, small businesses, businesses and labor communities and other public and private organizations. Evaluate the benefits expected as a result of the regulation.

The final-omitted regulation is not expected to have any fiscal impact as it is necessary for consistency with statutory requirements that already are in effect. The regulation will benefit public school students, their parents and guardians, teachers, and school administrators, by creating consistency in the compulsory school age requirements set forth in statute and related regulations.

(18) Explain how the benefits of the regulation outweigh any cost and adverse effects.

The regulation does not carry adverse effects as it simply conforms provision within 22 Pa. Code Chapters 11 and 12 that reference compulsory school age with the current definition of “compulsory school age” in Section 1326 of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P.S. § 13-1326).

This final-omitted regulation is not expected to have any impact on the regulated community as the amendments simply conform the regulations to a statutory change enacted in 2019 that already is in effect.

This final-omitted regulation is not expected to have any impact on local governments as the amendments simply conform the regulations to a statutory change enacted in 2019 that already is in effect.

This final-omitted regulation is not expected to have any impact on state government as the amendments simply conform the regulations to a statutory change enacted in 2019 that already is in effect.

The Board does not anticipate that this final-omitted rulemaking will affect the amount of legal, accounting, or administrative costs of the regulated community, local governments, or state government as the amendments simply conform the regulations to a statutory change enacted in 2019 that already is in effect.

Alternative regulatory provisions were not considered as the purpose of the final-omitted rulemaking is to make technical amendments that conform sections of existing regulations to more recent amendments enacted to a related statute.

FINAL-OMITTED RULEMAKING

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

[22 PA. CODE CHS. 11 & 12]

Student Attendance & Student Rights and Responsibilities

The State Board of Education (Board) amends Chapter 11 (relating to student attendance) and Chapter 12 (relating to student rights and responsibilities) to read as set forth in Annex A as a final-omitted rulemaking.

Statutory Authority

The Board is acting under the authority of sections 2603-B(a) and 2604-B(b)(2)(v) of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P.S. §§ 26-2603-B(a) and 26-2604-B (b)(2)(v)).

Background

Section 1326 of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P.S. § 13-1326) sets forth a definition for “compulsory school age” that establishes the ages during which attendance in school is required for children. Prior to the academic year commencing after August 27, 2019, the definition of “compulsory school age” required children to enter school no later than age 8 and to remain in school until the student reached at least age 17, unless the child had earned a certificate of graduation from high school. In Act 16 of 2019, the General Assembly amended the definition of “compulsory school age” to lower the age by which attendance in school is required from age 8 to age 6 and to raise the age for compulsory attendance in school from 17 to 18, unless the child had earned a certificate of graduation

from high school. Amendments to compulsory attendance requirements enacted by Act 16 of 2019 took effect with the academic year commencing after August 27, 2019.

Need for the rule

Provisions of the Board's regulations at 22 Pa. Code § 11.13 and 22 Pa. Code §§ 12.1(b) and 12.6(e) address requirements pertaining to compulsory school attendance. However, language in these provisions was not updated following the adoption of Act 16 of 2019 and continues to reference the ages for compulsory school attendance that were in effect prior to the General Assembly acting to amend the ages for compulsory attendance in Act 16. The final-omitted rulemaking is necessary to conform provisions in the Board's regulations that address requirements related to compulsory attendance with the current definition of "compulsory school age" in Section 1326 of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P.S. § 13-1326). At the same time, the Board also is acting to correct a typographical error in the text of 22 Pa. Code § 12.1(b)(4) as it is currently published.

Provisions of the Final-omitted Rulemaking

The final-omitted rulemaking amends the following provisions in Chapters 11 and 12:

Section 11.13. Compulsory school age.

The Board is amending Section 11.13 to reflect amendments to the definition of "compulsory school age" enacted by Act 16 of 2019 that lowered the age at which attendance in school is required from age eight (8) to age six (6) and increased the age through which compulsory attendance is required from age 17 to age 18, unless a student has graduated from high school. Technical amendments to this section update references to the ages for compulsory school attendance to be consistent with the current ages for

compulsory attendance established in Section 1326 of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P.S. § 13-1326).

Section 12.1(b). Free education and attendance.

The Board is making technical amendments to Section 12.1(b) to conform references to the ages for compulsory attendance with the current definition for “compulsory school age” established in Section 1326 of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P.S. § 13-1326).

Section 12.1(b)(4). Free education and attendance.

The Board is making a technical amendment to Section 12.1(b)(4) to correct a typographical error in the spelling of the word “eligible” in the text of the regulation as it is currently published.

Section 12.6(e). Exclusions from school.

The Board is making a technical amendment to Section 12.6(e) to conform a reference to the age for compulsory attendance with the current definition for “compulsory school age” established in Section 1326 of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P.S. § 13-1326).

Affected Parties

The final-omitted rulemaking will affect Pennsylvania’s 1.7 million public school students and their parents or guardians, as well as the state’s 124,000 classroom teachers and 8,192 school administrators, by creating consistency between a term as defined in statute and referenced in related regulations.

Cost and Paperwork Estimates

The final-omitted regulations will not impose any costs or additional administrative requirements on students, their parents, educators, or school entities. The final-omitted rulemaking contains technical amendments that make related provisions in 22 Pa. Code Chapters 11 and 12 consistent with statutory requirements that already are in effect. Thus, the rulemaking will not alter the current practice of public school entities or current requirements for parents to have their children enter and continue in school.

Effective Date

The final-form rulemaking will take effect upon notice or publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Sunset Date

The Board will review the effectiveness of Chapters 11 and 12 every four years in accordance with the Board's policy and practice respecting all of its regulations. Thus, no sunset date is necessary.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5.1(c) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(c)), on August 22, 2022, the Board submitted a copy of the final-omitted regulation to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House Committee on Education and the Senate Committee on Education. On the same date, the regulation was submitted to the Office of Attorney General for review and approval

pursuant to section 204 (b) of the Commonwealth Attorneys Act (71 P.S. §§ 732-101—732-506).

Under section 5.1(e) and (j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(e) and j.2)), the regulation was deemed approved by the House and Senate Education Committees on INSERT DATE, after IRRC's public meeting on INSERT DATE. The Office of Attorney General approved the final-omitted rulemaking on INSERT DATE.

Findings

The Board finds that:

(1) Notice of proposed rulemaking is impracticable, unnecessary and contrary to the public interest under section 204(3) of the Commonwealth Documents Law and the regulations thereunder, 1 Pa. Code § 7.4(3).

(2) The amendment of the regulations in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for administration of the Public School Code of 1949.

Order

Acting under the authority of the Public School Code of 1949, the Board orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Board, 22 Pa. Code Chapter 11 and 22 Pa. Code Chapter 12, are amended by amending § 11.13, § 12.1(b), § 12.1(b)(4), and § 12.6(e) to read as set forth in Annex A, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulation.

(b) The Executive Director of the Board shall submit a copy of this final-omitted regulation to the Office of General Counsel and the Office of Attorney General for review and approval as to legality and form as required by law.

- (c) The Executive Director of the Board shall submit this final-omitted regulation to IRRC and the House Education and Senate Education Committees as required by law.
- (d) The Executive Director of the Board shall certify this final-omitted regulation, as approved for legality and form, and deposit it with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (e) This final-omitted regulation shall take effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

ANNEX A
TITLE 22. EDUCATION
PART I. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION
CHAPTER 11. STUDENT ATTENDANCE

§ 11.13. Compulsory school age.

Except as otherwise provided by law, compulsory school age refers to the period of a child's life from the time the child enters school (which may be no later than at the age of [8] 6 years), until the age of [17] 18 or graduation from a high school, whichever occurs first.

CHAPTER 12. STUDENTS AND STUDENT SERVICES
STUDENT RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

§ 12.1. Free education and attendance.

(a) All persons residing in this Commonwealth between the ages of 6 and 21 years are entitled to a free and full education in the Commonwealth's public schools.

(b) Parents or guardians of all children between the ages of [8] 6 and [17] 18 are required by the compulsory attendance law to ensure that their children attend an approved educational institution, unless legally excused. Students who have not graduated may not be asked to leave school merely because they have reached [17] 18 years of age if they are fulfilling their

responsibilities as students. A student may not be excluded from the public schools or from extracurricular activities because:

- (1) The student is married.
- (2) The student is pregnant.
- (3) The student has a disability as identified by Chapter 15 (relating to protected handicapped students).
- (4) The student is an **[eligible] eligible** student identified under Chapter 14 (relating to special education services and programs).

§ 12.6. Exclusions from school.

(e) Students who are under **[17] 18** years of age are still subject to the compulsory school attendance law even though expelled and shall be provided an education.

(1) The initial responsibility for providing the required education rests with the student's parents or guardian, through placement in another school, tutorial or correspondence study, or another educational program approved by the district's superintendent.

(2) Within 30 days of action by the governing board, the parents or guardians shall submit to the school district written evidence that the required education is being provided as described in paragraph (1) or that they are unable to do so. If the parents or guardians are unable to provide the required education, the school entity shall, within 10 days of receipt of the notification, make

provision for the student's education. A student with a disability shall be provided educational services as required by the Individuals With Disabilities Education Act (20 U.S.C.A. § § 1400—1482).

(3) If the approved educational program is not complied with, the school entity may take action in accordance with 42 Pa.C.S. Chapter 63 (relating to the Juvenile Act) to ensure that the child will receive a proper education. See § 12.1(b) (relating to free education and attendance).
