This regulation permanently establishes the usage guidelines for green revolving or flashing lights on highway construction and maintenance vehicles engaged in official roadway maintenance, construction and safety operations. The regulation applies to the department, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission, Commonwealth municipalities, and contractors performing official business for the department, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission or municipalities. The department is replacing the temporary regulation authorized under 75 Pa.C.S. § 4572(b.2) (relating to visual signals on authorized vehicles) that is currently in effect with this regulation so that there is a permanent regulation related to the use of green revolving or flashing lights.				

(8) State the statutory authority for the regulation. Include specific statutory citation.

This regulation is issued under the authority of 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 4572(b.2) and 6103 (relating to visual signals on authorized vehicles; and promulgation of rules and regulations by department). Section 6103 grants broad authority to the department to promulgate rules and regulations to carry out its responsibilities under the Vehicle Code. Under 75 Pa.C.S. § 4572(b.2), the department is given specific authority to determine the manner in which green flashing or revolving lights are displayed on highway construction and maintenance vehicles and their intensity.

(9) Is the regulation mandated by any federal or state law or court order, or federal regulation? Are there any relevant state or federal court decisions? If yes, cite the specific law, case or regulation as well as, any deadlines for action.

Yes, the regulation is mandated by 75 Pa.C.S. 4572(b.2), which requires the department to promulgate a regulation on the manner in which green flashing or revolving lights are displayed on highway construction and maintenance vehicles and their intensity. The law permitted the department to promulgate a temporary regulation that would expire upon the promulgation of a final regulation or August 16, 2027, whichever is earlier. The temporary regulation took effect September 7, 2024. See 54 Pa.B. 5616. This regulation, once promulgated, will replace the temporary regulation.

No, there are not any relevant state or federal court decisions.

(10) State why the regulation is needed. Explain the compelling public interest that justifies the regulation. Describe who will benefit from the regulation. Quantify the benefits as completely as possible and approximate the number of people who will benefit.

This regulation is necessary to:

- Improve visibility and safety of work crews operating on Pennsylvania roadways.
- Improve the safety of the motoring public.
- Standardize who is authorized to use green revolving lights.
- Prevent misuse and unauthorized use of green revolving lights.
- Maintain continuity following the expiration of the temporary regulation.

Without this regulation, there would be no clear, permanent guidance on the use of green lights, potentially creating safety hazards and enforcement challenges.

The regulation will affect the department, the department's contractors, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission and municipalities that own an authorized highway construction and maintenance vehicle. It will affect the motoring public in general in that it should improve the overall safety of Pennsylvania roadways. While green lights are entirely optional under the law, those entities seeking to install the green lights would need to comply with this regulation. According to research conducted in other states, the human eye can identify green lights more clearly and brightly than traditional amber lighting. See <u>Green Warning Lights Enhance Plow Truck Visibility in Michigan - Clear Roads</u> and <u>SPR-1692-Report.pdf</u>

provisions and the compelling Pennsylvania interest that demands stronger regulations.
No, there are no provisions that are more stringent than federal standards.

(12) How does this regulation compare with those of the other states? How will this affect Pennsylvania's ability to compete with other states?
Pennsylvania's regulation on green lights closely aligns with those in Ohio, New York, Maryland, and New Jersey, all aimed to enhance employee and public safety during construction and maintenance operations. Flashing or revolving green lights are a proven technology utilized by other states such as Ohio, Michigan, Maine, Connecticut, North Carolina, Maryland, and New York as an option to allow for more visibility of construction and maintenance operations.
An independent effectiveness study was completed by Michigan State identifying the benefits:  Michigan DOT Green Light Research Report  Michigan Research Spotlight Document
This regulation should have little to no effect on Pennsylvania's ability to compete with other states. This regulation governs the use of green flashing or revolving lights on highway construction and maintenance vehicles. The installation of these lights is optional and does not mandate any requirements on the general public.
(13) Will the regulation affect any other regulations of the promulgating agency or other state agencies? If yes, explain and provide specific citations.
Yes, the regulation will affect another regulation of the department. Currently the department has a temporary regulation governing the use of green flashing or revolving lights on highway construction and maintenance vehicles. Upon promulgation of this regulation, the temporary regulation will expire. The regulation will not affect any regulations of any other state agency.

(14) Describe the communications with and solicitation of input from the public, any advisory council/group, small businesses and groups representing small businesses in the development and drafting of the regulation. List the specific persons and/or groups who were involved. ("Small business" is defined in Section 3 of the Regulatory Review Act, Act 76 of 2012.)

The temporary regulation has been effective since September 7, 2024, and the department has not received any negative feedback from the public, any advisory group, small business or group representing small business. Additionally, in November of 2024, the department emailed a memo titled Green Light Implementation, which provided general guidance and detailed the temporary regulation. The memo was sent to the following groups:

- (1) Associated Pennsylvania Constructors.
- (2) American Traffic Safety Services Association.
- (3) Pennsylvania Asphalt Pavement Association.
- (4) Pennsylvania Association of Asphalt Material Applicators.
- (5) Municipal Advisory Committee.
- (6) Pennsylvania's State Police.
- (7) Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission.

The department did not receive any feedback in response to the Memo.

(15) Identify the types and number of persons, businesses, small businesses (as defined in Section 3 of the Regulatory Review Act, Act 76 of 2012) and organizations which will be affected by the regulation. How are they affected?

This regulation will affect highway construction and maintenance workers which may include the department, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission, Pennsylvania municipalities, and contractors performing the maintenance and construction activities on behalf of Commonwealth agencies and municipalities. The exact number of agencies and municipalities affected will depend on the number of agencies and municipalities that choose to install the green lights on the vehicles.

Moreover, the motoring public will be provided green light indications providing an additional visual notification of the location of active work vehicles and devices while they are being used in key maintenance and construction activities.

This regulation will also affect automotive light bulb manufacturers engaged in the sale of green lights for highway construction and maintenance vehicles, as it will govern the display and intensity of these lights. Presumably, the regulation will benefit the manufacturers of these lighting systems as the sale of these new lighting systems is now approved by State law. In order to be considered a small business, an automotive light bulb manufacturer must have less than 1,250 employees. Therefore, the department is assuming that the majority of the automotive light bulb manufacturers are small businesses.

(16) List the persons, groups or entities, including small businesses, that will be required to comply with the regulation. Approximate the number that will be required to comply.

This regulation will require compliance by the department, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission, Pennsylvania municipalities, and contractors performing the maintenance and construction activities on behalf of Commonwealth agencies and municipalities. The exact number of agencies and municipalities that will be required to comply will depend on the number of agencies and municipalities that choose to install the green lights on the vehicles.

This regulation will also require automotive light bulb manufacturers engaged in the sale of green lights for highway construction and maintenance vehicles to comply, as it will govern the display and intensity of these lights. In order to be considered a small business, an automotive light bulb manufacturer must have less than 1,250 employees. Therefore, the department is assuming that the majority of the automotive light bulb manufacturers are small businesses.

(17) Identify the financial, economic and social impact of the regulation on individuals, small businesses, businesses and labor communities and other public and private organizations. Evaluate the benefits expected as a result of the regulation.

Financially, the regulation benefits automotive light bulb manufacturers that are now able to sell their green lights to the department, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission and municipalities, and the contractors that work for the agencies and municipalities, that choose to install green lights. This regulation will cost the department, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission and municipalities, and the contractors that work for the agencies and municipalities, that chose to install green lights additional money to have the lights installed. In reviewing preliminary data from vendors, costs on average may range between \$200 to \$2,000, depending on the device and features. More specifically, for the department, the cost to upfit 1,072 vehicles primarily used on interstate routes will be the following:

Light cost per vehicle; Crew Cab \$750 Truck \$1,900

Total cost of \$1,592,900

Economically, the regulation will benefit the motoring public, the department, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission and municipalities, and the contractors that work for the agencies and municipalities, because the increased safety provided by the green lights is projected to reduce the number of automobile accidents and resulting claims and lawsuits.

Socially, the regulation will benefit the motoring public, the department, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission and municipalities, and the contractors that work for the agencies and municipalities, because the increased safety provided by the green lights will make encourage travel and make the roads more accessible.

(18) Explain how the benefits of the regulation outweigh any cost and adverse effects.
If the department, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission or a municipality choses to install green flashing or revolving lights, the cost will differ significantly between multiple vehicle systems. The cost on average may range between \$200 to \$2,000, depending on the device and features. However, the cost to install these green lights is outweighed by the benefit to public safety. Studies have shown that green lights improve the visibility of highway maintenance vehicles as the human eye can identify green lights more clearly and brightly than traditional amber lights. See <a href="Michigan DOT Green Light Research Report">Michigan Research Spotlight Document</a> . This increase in visibility leads to an increase in public safety and will potentially saves lives, which is invaluable.
(19) Provide a specific estimate of the costs and/or savings to the <b>regulated community</b> associated with compliance, including any legal, accounting or consulting procedures which may be required. Explain how the dollar estimates were derived.
The regulation does not increase the legal, accounting or consulting costs incurred by the regulated community. The estimated cost of adding flashing or rotating green lights to highway construction and maintenance vehicles varies from \$200 to \$2000 per vehicle. However, doing so is optional.
(20) Provide a specific estimate of the costs and/or savings to the <b>local governments</b> associated with compliance, including any legal, accounting or consulting procedures which may be required. Explain how the dollar estimates were derived.
The regulation does not increase the legal, accounting or consulting costs incurred by the local governments. Local governments who own and operate highway construction and maintenance vehicles may incur costs between \$200 - \$2000 per vehicle, if they elect to incorporate green flashing or rotating lights on their vehicles. However, doing so is entirely optional.

(21) Provide a specific estimate of the costs and/or savings to the **state government** associated with the implementation of the regulation, including any legal, accounting, or consulting procedures which may be required. Explain how the dollar estimates were derived.

The regulation does not increase the legal, accounting or consulting costs incurred by the department. The costs to the department to upfit 1,072 vehicles primarily used on interstate routes will be the following:

Light cost per vehicle; Crew Cab \$750 Truck \$1,900

Total cost of \$1,592,900

**Final-Form Rulemaking** 

Flashing or Revolving Lights on Emergency and Authorized Vehicles Final-form Preamble November 12, 2025

The Department of Transportation (department), hereby amends §§ 173.2 and 173.3 (relating to definitions; and display requirements), concerning the use of green revolving or flashing lights on vehicles engaged in official roadway maintenance, construction and safety operations, to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

The amendments will be effective upon publication of the final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

This final-form rulemaking is authorized under 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 4572(b.2) and 6103 (relating to visual signals on authorized vehicles; and promulgation of rules and regulations by department). Section 6103 of 75 Pa.C.S. grants broad authority to the department to promulgate rules and regulations to carry out its responsibilities under 75 Pa.C.S. (relating to Vehicle Code). Under 75 Pa.C.S. § 4572(b.2), the department is given specific authority to determine the manner in which green flashing or revolving lights are displayed on highway construction and maintenance vehicles and their intensity.

Background and Need for the Amendment

This final-form rulemaking permanently establishes the usage guidelines for green revolving or flashing lights on highway construction and maintenance vehicles engaged in official roadway maintenance, construction and safety operations. This final-form rulemaking applies to the department, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission, municipalities within this Commonwealth and contractors performing official business for the department, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission or municipalities. The department is replacing the temporary regulation authorized

under 75 Pa.C.S. § 4572(b.2) that is currently in effect with this rulemaking so that there is a permanent regulation related to the use of green revolving or flashing lights. The temporary regulation was effective beginning September 7, 2024, and will expire upon promulgation of final-form regulations or August 16, 2027, whichever is earlier. This rulemaking is necessary to:

- Improve visibility and safety of work crews operating on roadways in this Commonwealth.
- Improve the safety of the motoring public.
- Standardize who is authorized to use green revolving lights.
- Prevent misuse and unauthorized use of green revolving lights.
- Maintain continuity following the expiration of the temporary regulation.

Without this regulation, there would be no clear, permanent guidance on the use of green lights, potentially creating safety hazards and enforcement challenges.

This final-form rulemaking affects the department, the department's contractors, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission and municipalities that own an authorized highway construction and maintenance vehicle. It affects the motoring public in general in that it should improve the overall safety of roadways in this Commonwealth. While green lights are entirely optional under the law, those entities seeking to install the green lights will need to comply with this final rulemaking. According to research conducted in other states, the human eye can identify green lights more clearly and brightly than traditional amber lighting.

Description of the Amendments

The department deletes the temporary regulation currently codified at § 173.3(a.1) and replaces it with a permanent regulation, described as follows.

The department adds a definition of "highway construction and maintenance vehicle" to § 173.2. The term is defined as set forth in 75 Pa.C.S. § 4572(d), which provides that the term "means a motor vehicle or device used by a municipality, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission, the department or their contractors for the maintenance, construction or repair of a highway or bridge. The term includes, but is not limited to, a vehicle or device used for snow removal, traffic-line-painting truck, sign and signal maintenance truck, dump truck, street sweeper, mower, highway inspection vehicle, vehicle used for traffic control and vehicle involved in traffic studies or investigations or right-of-way-operations."

In § 173.3, the department adds "green" to the list of authorized colors permitted for use in flashing or revolving lights in subsection (a) and adds paragraph (4.1) to provide that a highway construction and maintenance vehicle may be equipped with one or more flashing or revolving green lights when incorporated into one or more light-bar assemblies containing yellow or amber lights. The department deletes the restriction in paragraph (5)(i) that an authorized vehicle (which includes a highway construction and maintenance vehicle) may be equipped with one or more light-bar assemblies containing only yellow or amber lights.

Finally, the department deletes the temporary regulation pertaining to green lights in subsection (a.1).

### Public Comments

The department received no public comments. The department received no legislative comments, and the department received no comments from the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC). Accordingly, the department did not make any amendments to the annex in the final-form rulemaking.

### Fiscal Impact

This final-form rulemaking does not impose new costs on the department, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission or municipalities within this Commonwealth as these entities are already complying with the temporary regulation and the incorporation of green flashing or rotating lights is entirely optional. Contractors may incur minor costs if they decide to install green revolving or flashing lights, but since many are already doing so, additional financial impact is expected to be minimal.

### Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on July 30, 2025, the department submitted a copy of the proposed rulemaking, published at 55 Pa.B. 5684 (August 9, 2025), and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to IRRC and to the chairpersons of the Transportation Committee of the Senate and the chairpersons of the Transportation Committee of the House of Representatives for review and comment. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, the department is required to submit to IRRC and the House and Senate Committees copies of comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. The department received no public comments. IRRC did not submit comments on this rulemaking. In addition, the department received no comments from the Senate or House Committees.

Under section 5.1(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)(a)), on November 12, 2025, the department delivered this final-form rulemaking to IRRC and the House and Senate Committees. Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(j.2)) on

### Findings

The department finds that:

- (c) The department shall submit the final-form regulation to IRRC and the House and Senate Transportation Committees as required by law.
- (d) The department shall certify the final-form regulation and deposit it with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (e) This final-form regulation shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

### ARTICLE VII. VEHICLE CHARACTERISTICS

### CHAPTER 173. FLASHING OR REVOLVING LIGHTS ON EMERGENCY AND AUTHORIZED VEHICLES

### § 173.2. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

\* \* \* \* \*

Hazard warning system—Driver-controlled flashing front and rear lights used to warn approaching motorists when a vehicle is broken down or is traveling at a slow speed.

## <u>Highway construction and maintenance vehicle—The term as defined in 75 Pa.C.S. §</u> 4572(d) (relating to visual signals on authorized vehicles).

*Intersection light*—A flashing red, blue, white or clear light used as part of a flashing, oscillating, or revolving light system to enhance the visibility of an emergency vehicle from the front and side as it approaches or travels through an intersection.

\* \* \* \* \*

### § 173.3. Display requirements.

(a) *Color*. [Except as provided in subsection (a.1), white] White, clear, red, blue, green, amber or yellow are the only colors permitted for use in flashing or revolving lights.

\* \* \* \* \*

- (4) Combination red-and-blue lights. Vehicles listed under 75 Pa.C.S. § 4571(b) may display combination red-and-blue lights. The privately-owned vehicles defined as [an emergency vehicle] emergency vehicles under 75 Pa.C.S. § 102 (relating to definitions) must be equipped under 75 Pa.C.S. § 4571(a).
- (4.1) Green lights. Under 75 Pa.C.S. § 4572(b.2), a highway construction and maintenance vehicle may be equipped with one or more flashing or revolving green lights when incorporated into one or more light-bar assemblies containing yellow or amber lights in accordance with this section.
  - (5) Yellow or amber lights. A vehicle may display yellow or amber lights as follows:
- (i) Under 75 Pa.C.S. § 4572(b), an authorized vehicle as defined in 75 Pa.C.S. § 102 and designated in Chapter 15 (relating to authorized vehicles and special operating privileges) may be equipped with flashing or revolving yellow or amber lights or one or more light-bar assemblies containing **[only]** yellow or amber lights. See Figure 3.1.

\* \* \* \* \*

- (a.1) [Temporary regulation—Green lights. Under 75 Pa.C.S. § 4572(b.2), a highway construction and maintenance vehicle, as defined in 75 Pa.C.S. § 4572(d), may be equipped with one or more flashing or revolving green lights when incorporated into one or more light-bar assemblies containing yellow or amber lights in accordance with this section. This provision expires upon the promulgation of final regulations implementing the act of July 17, 2024 (P.L. 868, No. 78), but in no event later than August 16, 2027] {Reserved}.
- (b) 360° visibility. Except for unmarked police vehicles, when flashing or revolving red, blue, yellow or amber lights are mounted on a vehicle, one or more of these lights shall be mounted to

provide visibility to vehicles approaching from any direction ( $360^{\circ}$  visibility), regardless of the method of mounting.
