<p>(7) Briefly explain the regulation in clear and nontechnical language. (100 words or less)</p> <p>This proposed rulemaking effectuates 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 (relating to licensure by endorsement) for applicants licensed in other jurisdictions where the licensure requirements are substantially equivalent to or exceed those established by the State Board of Examiners of Nursing Home Administrators (Board). The Board is required to determine methods of demonstrating competency, including completion of continuing education (CE) or experience in the profession or occupation for at least 2 of the preceding 5 years, and must establish, by regulation, the expiration of provisional endorsement licenses. This proposed rulemaking sets forth eligibility criteria for licensure by endorsement, the specific methods required to demonstrate competency, and requirements for provisional endorsement licenses.</p>	
<p>(8) State the statutory authority for the regulation. Include <u>specific</u> statutory citation.</p> <p>Section 3111(a) of 63 Pa.C.S. requires licensing boards and commissions to issue a license, certificate, registration or permit to an applicant provided the applicant meets certain criteria for eligibility. The Board is proposing regulations to implement § 3111 (a)(1)–(5), relating to information required to determine:</p>	

whether another jurisdiction is substantially equivalent; the methods of competency; whether an applicant has committed an act that would be grounds for refusal, suspension or revocation of a license, certificate, registration or permit to practice in the profession or occupation in this Commonwealth, and whether such acts should be an impediment to licensure; whether an applicant has had disciplinary actions taken in another jurisdiction and whether such discipline should be an impediment to licensure; and the fee as established by the Board by regulation. Section 3111(b) of 63 Pa.C.S. also requires boards and commissions that issue provisional licenses, certificates, registration or permits to set the expiration of the provisional endorsement license by regulation.

The act of July 1, 2020, (P.L. 575, No. 53) added 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 as part of the consolidation of the act of July 2, 1993 (P.L. 345, No. 48) (Act 48) into Title 63, Chapter 31 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes. The text of 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 was originally added to Act 48 by the act of July 1, 2019 (P.L. 292, No. 41) (Act 41). This rulemaking effectuates Act 41.

Section 506 of the Admin. Code (71 P.S. §186) empowers the heads of all administrative departments, the several independent administrative boards and commissions, the several departmental administrative boards and commissions to prescribe rules and regulations not inconsistent with law, for the government of their respective departments, boards, or commissions.

Finally, section 4(a)(1) and (c) of the Nursing Home Administrators License Act (act) (63 P.S. § 1104(a)(1) and (c)) sets forth the Board's function, duty and authority, including, among other things, "[t]o develop, impose, and enforce standards which shall be met by individuals in order to receive a license as a nursing home administrator" and "to make rules and regulations, not inconsistent with law, as may be necessary for the proper performance of its duties..."

(9) Is the regulation mandated by any federal or state law or court order, or federal regulation? Are there any relevant state or federal court decisions? If yes, cite the specific law, case or regulation as well as, any deadlines for action.

Section 3111(a)(5) of 63 Pa.C.S. requires the Board to set the fee to be charged by regulation and subsection (b)(2) requires the Board to set an expiration of the provisional endorsement license. Section 2 of Act 41 directed that each licensing board and commission promulgate final regulations implementing Act 41. Otherwise, this rulemaking is not mandated by any Federal or state law or court order, or Federal regulation.

(10) State why the regulation is needed. Explain the compelling public interest that justifies the regulation. Describe who will benefit from the regulation. Quantify the benefits as completely as possible and approximate the number of people who will benefit.

The regulation is needed to implement 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 to provide for licensure by endorsement to applicants from other states, territories and countries. Act 41 was enacted due to a recognition that licensed professionals from other jurisdictions have difficulty obtaining a license to practice in this Commonwealth. Licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 helps eliminate unnecessary barriers to licensure for citizens from other jurisdictions and for military personnel and their spouses while maintaining sufficient safeguards to ensure public protection. Section 3111 of 63 Pa.C.S. enables boards and commissions under the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Bureau) to issue a license by endorsement, and further provides for a provisional endorsement license to quickly move these professionals into the workforce without unnecessary delays, which reduces the barriers to employment.

Since the effective date of Act 41 (August 30, 2019), the Board has received and considered 0 licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 applications. Therefore, the Board has issued 0 licenses by endorsement. Based upon the number of applications received, the Board estimates receiving 0 applications on a biennial basis or an average of 0 yearly.

The Board offers many pathways to licensure, and applicants are allowed to decide for themselves which pathway is the least burdensome and most appropriate. Applicants overwhelmingly choose to provide the Board with proof the applicant meets the educational requirements, which can be as simple as proof of having earned a high school diploma and completion of the board-approved 120-hour program. The Board has not yet received any applications for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111. The Board anticipates that licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 may be a viable pathway for applicants from other countries because the Board's current reciprocity requirements only relate to applicants from other states. Since the effective date of Act 41, the Board has not received an application from another country. Accordingly, the Board has not yet issued a license by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111.

(11) Are there any provisions that are more stringent than federal standards? If yes, identify the specific provisions and the compelling Pennsylvania interest that demands stronger regulations.

There are no federal standards applicable to the subject matter of the regulation.

(12) How does this regulation compare with those of the other states? How will this affect Pennsylvania's ability to compete with other states?

This regulation will not adversely affect Pennsylvania's ability to compete with other states. The purpose of 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 is to make it easier for out-of-state applicants, including military spouses, who have an out-of-state professional or occupational license to work in Pennsylvania. The purpose of 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 is also to reduce barriers to employment, which will make Pennsylvania more competitive. 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 and the Board's proposed regulations will encourage skilled workers and their families to move to Pennsylvania, which will enhance the workforce, provide more talent for businesses, and help grow Pennsylvania's economy. Surrounding states also have similar laws and regulations for licensure by endorsement in the nursing home administration field(s).

In comparing the proposed regulation to other states, the Board researched states in the Northeastern region of the United States. The Board identified one other State (New Jersey) that has a comprehensive license by endorsement law that is applicable to the various professional licensing boards in New Jersey. Similar to 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111, New Jersey requires its professional licensing boards to issue a license to any person who holds a current professional or occupational license in good standing whose licensure standards are substantially equivalent to the current standards of New Jersey. New Jersey requires applicants to demonstrate competency through experience in the practice of the profession within 5 years prior to the date of the application. Pennsylvania also allows for additional methods of competency, including completion of CE. Thus, Pennsylvania's competency requirements are similar to New Jersey and even provide for more ways to demonstrate competency. Additionally, unlike the Board's proposed regulations, New Jersey does not provide discretion to issue a provisional license.

The Board also researched whether other nursing home administrator (NHA) state boards have similar licensure by endorsement laws and regulations applicable to the NHA profession. For those states that have similar licensure by endorsement laws and regulations applicable to the NHA profession, the Board compared other states standards in areas where the Board is using its discretion in proposing regulations for competency methods and provisional licenses, including expiration of the provisional license, if any.

The Delaware Board of Examiners of Nursing Home Administrators allows licensure by reciprocity where it is determined the other jurisdiction of current license and practice has licensure standards substantially similar to the standards of Delaware. The Delaware board's requirements for competency include either a NHA actively licensed in another jurisdiction that has substantially similar standards or 3 years of experience in the practice of nursing home administration. Applicants must also pay the application fees, submit the relevant law of the other jurisdictions for board review and complete a criminal history record check. The Delaware board does not currently allow for a provisional license.

The Maryland State Board of Long-Term Care Administrators allows for licensure by endorsement for applicants who meet the educational requirements and have worked as a licensed NHA in another state for at least 1 year within the past 5 years. The other licensing jurisdiction(s) must have substantially equivalent licensure standards and recognize Maryland's board licensure. By regulation, the applicant must be familiar with the state's NHA laws and take Maryland's NHA standards examination. If applicants have less than 1 year of experience in nursing home administration or the experience falls outside of the 5-year time frame, it will be necessary for applicants to meet the 1 year by either having experience in another approved category, or by going into a board-approved Administrator-In-Training (AIT) program. Maryland does not currently issue a provisional license.

The New York Board of Examiners of Nursing Home Administrators does not have reciprocity for NHAs licensed in another state but does have licensure for NHAs with 2 or more years of experience as the full-time Administrator-of-Record of an out-of-state nursing facility within the last five years. This type of licensure of out-of-state NHAs requires applicants to be 21 years old or older, of good moral character and suitability, and with a bachelor's degree (or higher) with 15 credit hours of specific education (experience may supplement the credits requirement). Applicants must have a passing scale score on the national NHA Licensing exam. The New York board does not allow for a provisional license.

The Ohio Board of Executives of Long-Term Services & Supports allow for licensure of out-of-state applicants who have a current and active license, at least a bachelor's degree, 9-12 months of experience either through an internship or actual employment as an NHA, and no prior discipline. If the applicants administrative experience is less than what is required, the Ohio board may require the applicant to complete an internship and/or the Core of Knowledge assessment to reach the equivalent experience/education required. All applicants are required to be familiar with Ohio's laws and rules relative to the licensure of the facility and to the licensure of the administrator, and to pass the Ohio NHA licensure examination through NAB. No allowances for a provisional license were found in Ohio.

The West Virginia Nursing Home Administrator's Licensing Board allows for licensure of out-of-state applicants who have Nationally approved certification or are licensed in another state that has substantially equivalent licensure standards, including education and examinations. Applicants cannot have prior discipline and must have a clean query from the Federal National Practitioner Data Bank. No allowances for a provisional license were found for NHA licenses in West Virginia.

Based on this research relating to other states' licensure by endorsement and/or reciprocity requirements, the board believes the amendments will not put Pennsylvania at a competitive disadvantage. In fact, the board believes the amendments will put Pennsylvania at a competitive advantage compared to other states that do not allow NHA applicants for licensure by endorsement/reciprocity to practice under a provisional license while they complete competency requirements. Also, the proposed amendments allow for more methods of showing competency than the other states which were researched, including the teaching of long-term care education, additional hours in a program of study and experience in a supervisory or

consultant compacity in a nursing home. This removes barriers for qualified applicants who are licensed NHAs in other jurisdictions where licensure standards are substantially equivalent and supports the same quality of care expected of currently licensed NHAs.

(13) Will the regulation affect any other regulations of the promulgating agency or other state agencies? If yes, explain and provide specific citations.

No. The regulation does not affect any other regulations of the Board or other state agencies. However, there are other boards that have or will be promulgating similar regulations.

(14) Describe the communications with and solicitation of input from the public, any advisory council/group, small businesses and groups representing small businesses in the development and drafting of the regulation. List the specific persons and/or groups who were involved. (“Small business” is defined in Section 3 of the Regulatory Review Act, Act 76 of 2012.)

The Board discusses its regulatory proposals at regularly scheduled public meetings of the Board. Representatives of the professional associations representing the regulated community routinely attend those meetings. In drafting the proposal, on September 13, 2023, the Board solicited comments from stakeholders and interested parties. No comments were received on the exposure draft annex.

(15) Identify the types and number of persons, businesses, small businesses (as defined in Section 3 of the Regulatory Review Act, Act 76 of 2012) and organizations which will be affected by the regulation. How are they affected?

All Board applicants seeking licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 will be affected by the regulation, including those that are or work for small businesses. At the present time, there are approximately 1,729 active NHAs licensed by the Board, 234 of these licensees obtained their license under § 1110 of the act concerning reciprocity and regulations under § 39.8 (currently regarded as licensure by endorsement). For purposes of this rulemaking, the Board estimates 0 individuals will apply for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 biennially or an average of 0 individuals annually. If an applicant for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 were to apply, this individual would be required to pay a \$40 license application fee. This fee is the same amount as all applicants for initial licensure under the act.

According to the Small Business Administration (SBA), there are approximately 1,169,008 small businesses in Pennsylvania, which is 99.6% of all Pennsylvania businesses. Of the 1,169,008 small businesses, 230,244 are small employers (those with fewer than 500 employees) and the remaining 938,764 are non-employers. Thus, the vast majority of businesses in Pennsylvania are considered small businesses.

According to the Pennsylvania Department of Labor and Industry (PA L&I) in 2020 (the most recent year for which data is available), licensed NHAs are categorized under Medical and Health Services Managers, which category includes employment figure nationally at state, local, and private hospitals (33%), offices of physicians (12%), nursing and residential care facilities (10%), government (9%) and outpatient care centers (7%). Within Pennsylvania, the PA L&I in 2022 (the most recent year for which data is available) reported the top employers under Medical and Health Services Managers as general medical and surgical hospitals (24.45%), offices of physicians (12.40%), and home health care services (8.53%), with nursing

care facilities (skilled nursing facilities) accounting for 3.75% of employment and continuing care retirement communities and assisted living facilities for the elderly at 3.35% employment.

Small businesses are defined in Section 3 of the Regulatory Review Act, (71 P.S. § 745.3) which provides that a small business is defined by the SBA's Small Business Size Regulations under 13 CFR Ch. 1 Part 121. These size standards have been established for types of businesses under the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS). In applying the 2023 NAICS standards to the types of employment where specifically NHAs may work, Nursing Care Facilities (Skilled Nursing Facilities) (NAICS code #623110) and Continuing Care Retirement Communities (NAICS code #623311) would be considered a small business if their average annual receipts are \$34 million or less. Assisted Living Facilities for the Elderly (NAICS #623312) are considered small businesses if their annual receipts average \$23.5 million or less and Home Health Care Services (NAICS #621610) are considered small businesses if their annual receipts average \$19 million or less.

Based upon this information, the Board believes that most NHAs in Pennsylvania are employed in small businesses. However, the Board does not collect information on the size of the businesses where its licensees are employed. For purposes of determining the economic impact on small businesses, the Board assumes that a large number of its licensees work for small businesses as that term is defined by the SBA and Pennsylvania's Regulatory Review Act. For those licensees who are employees of small businesses, whether these small businesses will be impacted by the regulations depends on whether the businesses would voluntarily pay the costs associated with employees applying for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 and any competency requirements. Because the license application fees and other costs are incurred by individuals applying for initial licensure by endorsement, any business (small or otherwise) could avoid these costs by requiring employees to pay their own licensure costs.

The Board believes that the proposed rulemaking will have a positive impact in that it is implementing 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111, which provides an additional pathway to licensure that previously did not exist.

(16) List the persons, groups or entities, including small businesses, that will be required to comply with the regulation. Approximate the number that will be required to comply.

Applicants for licensure by endorsement under § 3111 as an NHA will be required to comply with the proposed rulemaking. The Board has not yet received any applications for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111. The Board anticipates that licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 may be a viable pathway for applicants from other countries because the Board's current reciprocity requirements only relate to applicants from other states. Since the effective date of Act 41, the Board has not received an application from another country, so it does not expect to receive any in the near future. Small businesses will only be impacted to the extent they voluntarily pay licensure fees and other costs for applicants.

The Board offers many pathways to licensure, and applicants are allowed to decide for themselves which pathway is the least burdensome and most appropriate. The Board has not yet received any applications for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111. Accordingly, the Board has not yet issued a license by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111.

(17) Identify the financial, economic and social impact of the regulation on individuals, small businesses, businesses and labor communities and other public and private organizations. Evaluate the benefits expected as a result of the regulation.

This Commonwealth will benefit from licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111. The purpose of 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 is to make it easier for out-of-state applicants, including military spouses, who have an out-of-state professional or occupational license to work in Pennsylvania. 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 also reduces barriers to employment, which will make Pennsylvania more competitive. 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 and the Board's regulations will encourage skilled workers and their families to move to Pennsylvania, which will enhance the workforce, provide more talent for businesses, and help grow Pennsylvania's economy.

The citizens of this Commonwealth will also benefit from the enhanced workforce and growth in economy while still having assurance of a level of competence similar to existing licensees in this Commonwealth. The Board has selected methods of competence, including licensed practice in the profession for any two of the last 5 years, CE and other continuing competency requirements, to effectuate this goal. These methods assure competency because they show that the applicant has remained current with technological advancements and other updates within the profession and has the requisite knowledge and skills to practice nursing home administration. The provisional endorsement license provision also allows applicants who need to satisfy outstanding requirements, such as years of experience to demonstrate competency, to practice under a provisional license while the applicant satisfies the remaining requirements for licensure by endorsement.

The financial impact of the regulation falls primarily on the applicants and the Board. Individuals seeking licensure by endorsement will incur costs associated with qualifying for and obtaining a license. As noted above, an applicant applying for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 would be required to pay the \$40 license application fee, which covers the costs of processing the application. This license application fee is the same for other applicants applying for initial licensure under the act. For applicants from other countries and territories, if the other law, regulation or other rule is in a language other than English, § 39.8a(a)(1)(ii) would require the applicant to have it professionally translated at the applicant's expense. The Board anticipates that the translation costs will be approximately \$25 per page and range between two and five pages in length. The Board has been able to accept and process licensure by endorsement application since the effective date of Act 41. To date, the Board has not received any licensure by endorsement applications from applicants needing translation.

The positive impact for the applicants is that 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 and the proposed regulation provides a new pathway to licensure that did not previously exist.

(18) Explain how the benefits of the regulation outweigh any cost and adverse effects.

As previously discussed, 63 Pa. C. S. § 3111 benefits this Commonwealth and its citizens and individual applicants wishing to obtain licensure. The costs associated with obtaining licensure are outweighed by the need of the Board to set fees to cover its costs for processing applications to maintain the fiscal integrity of the Board, and by the equity of assessing the costs of processing applications to the applicants themselves, as opposed to the existing licensee population bearing these costs through increased biennial renewal fees. The General Assembly contemplated and weighed the impact of imposing fees on applicants in 63 Pa. C. S. § 3111(a)(5) against the benefits of providing an additional pathway to licensure to individuals from other jurisdictions. While avoiding economic impact to applicants is always preferable, the General Assembly recognized that boards fees are necessary in order to pay for the costs associated with the filing of applications. Additionally, whether an applicant obtains licensure by examination or by endorsement, applicants pay the same application fees (i.e. license application fee, Criminal History Record Check (CHRC) fee); therefore, for the most part, any additional cost to the licensure by endorsement applicant is minimal.

Regarding the cost of translating the law, regulation or other rule to English, this is a necessary part of the application process. If the Board is unable to understand the other jurisdiction's requirements, it will not be able to determine whether those requirements are substantially equivalent. The Board has not yet received any applications for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111. The Board anticipates that licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 may be a viable pathway for applicants from other countries because the Board's current reciprocity requirements only relate to applicants from other states. Since the effective date of Act 41, the Board has not received an application from another country, so it does not expect to receive any in the near future.

Regarding costs associated with demonstrating competency, the Board is authorized to select the methods of competency under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111(a)(2) and has provided applicants with multiple alternatives. Applicants for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 may demonstrate competency by a method available under § 39.11b (relating to continued competence), which provides applicants with several options. For example, applicants who demonstrate competency through experience in the practice of nursing home administration in another jurisdiction for at least 2 years within the last 5 years under a current license in that jurisdiction will incur no costs to demonstrate competency. Applicants who demonstrate competency through experience by having been employed in a nursing home in a supervisory or consultant capacity for at least 3 years within the last 5 years will incur no costs to demonstrate competency. However, several of these methods may incur additional costs to complete. For example, applicants who choose to demonstrate competency through Board-approved examinations or successfully completing 120 clock hours in a program of study approved by the Board, where the successful completion or recompletion of part of the requirement immediately precedes the date of application, will incur costs to demonstrate competency. The methods under § 39.11b are the same for any licensed NHA reactivating a license that has been expired or inactive for 5 years or longer.

Applicants who demonstrate competency by completing 48 hours of CE during the 24 months immediately preceding the date of their application, will incur minimal costs to complete necessary CE, especially if applicants are able to use all or part of the CE obtained to maintain their licensing in another jurisdiction for this requirement. Additionally, completing the mandatory child abuse recognition and reporting training will not have a negative fiscal impact if the applicant chooses a free training course. Requiring licensees to take this training will have a positive impact on the profession and for Pennsylvania citizens because NHAs will be educated on recognizing child abuse and will also have specific training on how to report child abuse in this Commonwealth.

Regardless of which alternative the applicant chooses the costs that may be incurred would be outweighed by the benefits of this proposed regulation. Moreover, demonstrating competency is a statutory requirement; it helps to ensure applicants are safe to practice the profession and will not present a danger to the public.

(19) Provide a specific estimate of the costs and/or savings to the **regulated community** associated with compliance, including any legal, accounting or consulting procedures which may be required. Explain how the dollar estimates were derived.

An individual applying for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 will incur some costs, including paying the \$40 license application fee and any costs associated with demonstrating competency.

The Board offers many pathways to licensure, and applicants are allowed to decide for themselves which pathway is the least burdensome and most appropriate. The Board has not yet received any applications for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111. The Board anticipates that licensure by

endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 may be a viable pathway for applicants from other countries because the Board's current reciprocity requirements only relate to applicants from other states. Since the effective date of Act 41, the Board has not received an application from another country, so it does not expect to receive any in the near future.

Applicants will have to pay a fee associated with conducting a background check – currently \$22 for a Pennsylvania Criminal History Records Check (CHRC) obtained from the Pennsylvania State Police (PSP), and a recent CHRC from the state police or other state agency for every state in which the individual has lived, worked, or completed professional training/studies for the past 5 years. The cost for outside CHRC will vary depending on the states where applicant has resided for the last 5 years. For purposes of calculating an estimate of the approximate costs in this rulemaking, \$22 was chosen. These costs are required for all applicants regardless of method for licensure.

As discussed previously, completing the mandatory child abuse recognition and reporting training will not have a cost to the applicant who chooses a free training course. Also, applicants who needed to have a jurisdiction's laws or regulations translated into English may incur translation fees of approximately \$25 per page with the average length expected to range between two and five pages.

While these costs would be applicable to individuals applying for licensure, because the Board has not received any applications, it does not anticipate any costs to the regulated community.

The regulation would not result in costs or savings to local governments.

The Board will incur increased operational costs to implement the licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa. C. S. § 3111. The costs incurred by the Board should be recouped in the form of application fees paid by the applicants.

There should be no legal, accounting or consulting procedures associated with this rulemaking. Like all other applicants under the Board, affected individuals will be required to submit an application for licensure accompanied by required documentation and payment of a fee.

Yes, applicants are required to submit an online application.

The Bureau uses an online platform for the submission of applications for licensure through PALS, which also encompasses applications for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa. C.S. § 3111. Within the online platform, applicants are asked a series of questions. Applicants are asked if they are currently licensed in another jurisdiction and the type of license for which they are applying. Applicants currently licensed in another jurisdiction, which is defined in the proposed rulemaking as another state, territory or country, are directed to submit a copy of the current applicable law, regulation or other rule governing licensure, certification, registration or permit requirements and scope of practice in the jurisdiction that issued the license, translated into English if needed. Applicants are required to indicate whether they have been disciplined by the jurisdiction in which they are licensed or any other jurisdiction. Applicants with disciplinary history must upload appropriate documentation related to the discipline.

Applicants will have to submit a background check. These costs are required for all applicants regardless of method for licensure.

Based upon the above, applications are forwarded to the Board, if necessary, to determine eligibility under 63 Pa. C.S. § 3111. The Bureau is working towards creating a more detailed electronic application process specific to 63 Pa. C.S. § 3111 applications, which will decrease the need for manual review of applications. The Board attaches a paper application which will be the basis for developing the electronic licensure by endorsement application. (See Attachment “A”.)

Because these fees are incurred by individuals applying for initial licensure, any business (small or otherwise) could avoid these costs by requiring employees to pay their own licensure costs.
- (b) This rulemaking will not impose additional reporting, recordkeeping or other administrative costs on small businesses.
- (c) The probable effect on impacted small businesses would be positive because 63 Pa. C. Code Part IV Subpart C (relating to long term care facilities).
- C. Has not committed any act that constitutes grounds for refusal, suspension or revocation of a license, certification, registration or permit to practice nursing home administration under section 12(a) of the act (63 P.S. §§ 1112(a)) or section 39.9 (49 Pa.Code § 39.9) (relating to revocation or suspension of licenses) and has not been disciplined by the jurisdiction that issued the license, certificate, registration or permit.
- D. Has paid the application fee for licensure by endorsement, \$40.
- E. LICENSURE BY ENDORSEMENT UNDER 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111

The State Board of Examiners of Nursing Home Administrators (board) proposes to amend Chapter 39 by amending §§ 39.1, 39.4, 39.8 and 39.92 and adding §§ 39.8a and 39.8b (relating to licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111; and provisional endorsement license) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

This proposed rulemaking will be effective upon publication of the final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

Section 3111 of 63 Pa.C.S. (relating to licensure by endorsement) requires licensing boards and commissions to “issue a license, certificate, registration or permit to an applicant to allow practice in this Commonwealth” provided the applicant meets the following criteria: “[h]olds a current license, certificate, registration or permit from another state, territory or country” whose licensing “requirements are substantially equivalent to or exceed the requirements. . .in this Commonwealth;” “demonstrates competency;” “[h]as not committed any act that constitutes grounds for refusal, suspension or revocation of a license, certificate, registration or permit to practice that profession or occupation in this Commonwealth, unless the board or commission determines” such conduct is not an impediment to granting the “license, certificate, registration or permit”, “[i]s in good standing and has not been disciplined by the jurisdiction that issued the license, certificate, registration or permit, unless the. . .board or. . .commission determines” such conduct is not an impediment to granting the “license, certificate, registration or permit” and the applicant pays fees, as established by regulation. Additionally, 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 authorizes boards and commissions to “issue a provisional license, certificate, registration, or permit” while an

applicant is satisfying remaining requirements for licensure by endorsement, for which the board must set by regulation the terms of expiration.

The act of July 1, 2020, (P.L. 575, No. 53) added 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 as part of the consolidation of the act of July 2, 1993 (P.L. 345, No. 48) (Act 48) into Title 63, Chapter 31 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes. The text of 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 was originally added to Act 48 by the act of July 1, 2019 (P.L. 292, No. 41) (Act 41). This rulemaking effectuates Act 41.

Section 506 of the Admin. Code (71 P.S. §186) empowers the heads of all administrative departments, the several independent administrative boards and commissions, the several departmental administrative boards and commissions to prescribe rules and regulations not inconsistent with law, for the government of their respective departments, boards, or commissions.

Section 4(a)(1) and (c) of the Nursing Home Administrators License Act (act) (63 P.S. § 1104(a)(1) and (c)) sets forth the board’s function, duty and authority, including among other things, “[t]o develop, impose, and enforce standards which shall be met by individuals in order to receive a license as a nursing home administrator” and “to make rules and regulations, not inconsistent with law, as may be necessary for the proper performance of its duties...”

Background and Need for the Amendments

This proposed rulemaking is needed to effectuate 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111, which requires the board to issue a license to applicants who meet the requirements for licensure by endorsement as set forth in 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111(a)(1). Under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111(a)(1), the board must determine whether the jurisdiction’s standards for licensure are substantially equivalent to or exceed those established by the board. Additionally, 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111(a)(2) requires the board to determine the methods of competency, including completion of continuing education or experience in the profession or occupation for at least 2 of the 5 years immediately preceding the filing of the

application. Under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111(b)(2), the board must establish, by regulation, the expiration of the provisional endorsement license.

This proposed rulemaking sets forth the board’s criteria for eligibility for licensure by endorsement, including the specific methods required for an applicant to demonstrate competency. It also sets forth the requirements for granting a provisional endorsement license. Section 3111 of 63 Pa.C.S. further provides that the board may establish appropriate fees for this licensure. The fees established by the board for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 are the same for all license applications under the board.

In accordance with the requirements of Executive Order 1996-1 (4 Pa. Code §§ 1.371—1.382), on September 13, 2023, the board sent an exposure draft of this proposed rulemaking to interested parties. No comments were received on the exposure draft annex.

Description of the proposed amendments

The board proposes to amend §§ 39.1 and 39.92 (relating to definitions; and reporting of crimes and disciplinary actions) to incorporate the term and definition for “jurisdiction” consistent with 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111, which is defined as “a state, territory or country.” The board also proposes amendments to §§ 39.4(2) and 39.8 (relating to admission to practice; temporary permits; and licensure by endorsement) to replace the term ‘endorsement’ in these sections with the term ‘reciprocity’ to clarify that the licensure addressed in these sections relates to reciprocity under section 10 of the act (63 P. S. § 1110) and not endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111. The Board proposes to add § 39.4(4) to include licensure by endorsement and provisional licensure as additional methods for applicants to obtain a license in this Commonwealth. Additionally, because the board has transitioned to an online application process and, therefore no longer accepts paper applications or certified checks or money orders for licensing purposes, and also no longer requires

applicants to provide passport size photographs, the board proposes to update § 39.8(a) and(b) by deleting references to paper applications, certified checks and money orders, and passport size photographs. Instead, § 39.8(a) will require that applicants for licensure by reciprocity shall submit an application in accordance with this chapter and in the manner and format prescribed by the board, and § 39.8(b) will be deleted and reserved.

Proposed § 39.8a (relating to licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111) requires an applicant to satisfy eight criteria required for licensure by endorsement. Under subsection (a)(1), an applicant shall have a current license, certification, registration or permit in good standing to practice nursing home administration in another jurisdiction whose standards are substantially equivalent to or exceed standards established under sections 6 and 8 (a) of the act (63 P.S. § 1106 and 1108(a)) and §§ 39.5 and 39.7 (relating to requirements for admission to licensing examination; examination procedures; and subject matter for examinations). Proposed subsection (a)(1) further requires an applicant to submit a copy of the current applicable law, regulation or other rule governing licensure, certification, registration or permit requirements and scope of practice in the jurisdiction that issued the license, certificate, registration or permit. This proposed subsection would also require that the copy of the applicable law, regulation or other rule include the enactment date. Additionally, because 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 is applicable to territories and other countries that use languages other than English, when the applicable law, regulation or other rule is in a language other than English, the board would require, at the applicant's expense, translation of the applicable law, regulation or other rule by a professional translation service.

Proposed subsection (a)(2) requires demonstration of competency. Under this provision, an applicant may provide proof of competency by demonstrating experience in accordance with § 39.11b (relating to continued competence) in the past 5 years or by completing 48 hours of

continuing education in the past 2 years. To demonstrate competency by experience, an applicant must meet one or more of the standards under § 39.11b where applicants have the option to either pass the licensure examinations approved by the board, recomplete 120 clock hours in a program of study approved by the board, provide written documentation that shows the applicant has practiced nursing home administration in another jurisdiction for at least 2 years within the last 5 years or has been employed in a nursing home in a supervisory or consultant capacity for at least 3 of the last 5 years, or provide written documentation that shows the applicant has been teaching long-term care subject matter under an approved provider for at least 3 of the last 5 years. These methods of proving competency under § 39.11b, including the licensed practice of nursing home administration for at least 2 of the last 5 years in another jurisdiction, are the same options for proving competency for licensees in this Commonwealth seeking to reactivate a license that has been expired or inactive for 5 years or longer and thus would be appropriate methods for applicants licensed in other jurisdictions to seek licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111. The board requires proof of competency within the past 5 years to comply with 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111(a)(2), which requires the board to determine the methods of competency, including experience in the profession or occupation for at least 2 of the 5 years preceding the date of the application.

Another method to demonstrate competency in subsection (a)(2) is through completion of continuing education where an applicant must submit proof of completion of 48 hours of continuing education that meets the requirements of § 39.61(a)-(c) (relating to requirements) during the 24 months immediately preceding the filing of the application. The board proposes completion of the continuing education within 24 months immediately preceding the date of the application because a 24-month limitation correlates with the board's biennial renewal continuing education requirement.

Regardless of how applicants decide to prove competency in subsection (a)(2), applicants must demonstrate competency by verifying, in a manner and format approved by the board, to having read and understood the regulations of the board and the regulations of the Department of Health in 28 Pa. Code Part IV Subpart C (relating to long term care facilities). Section 39.5(d) requires that applicants seeking licensure by examination pass a written examination that comprises two parts: (1) the “uniform part” and (2) the “state part”. Section 39.5(d)(1) describes the “uniform part” as “[a]n examination on the general principles of nursing home administration that are common to all jurisdictions that license nursing home administrators,” whereas § 39.5(d)(2) describes the “state part” as “[a]n examination on the regulations of the Department of Health in 28 Pa. Code Part IV Subpart C (relating to long term care facilities).” To demonstrate competency in Pennsylvania-specific practice, applicants from other jurisdictions must verify that they have read and understood the board’s regulations, as well as the regulations of the Department of Health in 28 Pa. Code Part IV Subpart C (relating to long term care facilities). This will help ensure that applicants from other jurisdictions are qualified to practice in this Commonwealth. A question will be added to the standard application asking if the applicant has read and understood the regulations of the board and the regulations of the Department of Health in 28 Pa. Code Part IV Subpart C, and the applicant will respond by checking “yes,” or “no.”

Proposed subsections (a)(3) and (4) incorporate the statutory prohibitions in 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111(a)(3) and (4) pertaining to conduct that would constitute grounds for refusal, suspension or revocation of a license, certificate, registration or permit to practice the profession or occupation, and prior discipline by the jurisdiction that issued the license.

Proposed subsection (a)(5) provides for payment of an application fee, as required under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111(a)(5). The applicable fee for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111

will be the existing “license application fee” in § 39.72 (relating to fees), which is \$40 under the board’s current fee schedule. This is the same fee for all applicants under the board submitting license applications for review.

Proposed subsection (a)(6) requires applicants to apply for licensure in accordance with Chapter 39 and in the manner and format prescribed by the board.

Finally, proposed subsection (a)(7) requires completion of 3 hours of training in child abuse recognition and reporting, which is mandated training for all initial applicants under the Child Protective Services Law at 23 Pa.C.S. § 6383(b)(3)(i) (relating to education and training).

In proposed § 39.8a(b), the board may require a personal interview or additional information to assist the board in determining eligibility and competency. When a personal interview is necessary, the applicant may request the interview to be conducted by video teleconference for good cause shown.

Consistent with 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111(a)(3) and (4), proposed § 39.8a(c) authorizes the board, in its discretion, to determine that an act prohibited under section 12(a) of the act (63 P.S. § 1112(a)) or § 39.9 (relating to revocation or suspension of licenses) or disciplinary action by another jurisdiction are not impediments to the granting of a license by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111. The board routinely considers whether discipline or prohibited acts are impediments to licensure. The types of things the board considers include the facts and circumstances surrounding the prohibited act or disciplinary action; an increase in age or maturity of the individual since the date of the prohibited act or disciplinary action; disciplinary history or lack of disciplinary history before and after the date of the prohibited act or disciplinary action; successful completion of education and training activities relating to the prohibited act or disciplinary action; and any other information relating to the fitness of the individual for licensure.

Consistent with section 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111(b), proposed § 39.8b provides that the board, in its discretion, may issue a provisional endorsement license while an applicant is satisfying remaining requirements under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 and proposed § 39.8a. Proposed § 39.8b(b)(1) sets the expiration of a provisional endorsement license at 1 year, unless the board determines that an expiration date of less than 1 year is appropriate. Additionally, upon a written request, the board may extend the term of the license upon a showing of good cause. Proposed § 39.8b(c) sets forth reasons for which a provisional endorsement license will be terminated by the board, including when the board denies or grants a license, when the provisional endorsement licensee fails to comply with the terms of a provisional endorsement license or upon expiration of a provisional endorsement license.

Finally, proposed § 39.8b(d) clarifies that while an individual may reapply for a license by endorsement under proposed § 39.8a, the board will not issue a subsequent provisional endorsement license to an applicant who previously held a provisional endorsement license that expired or was terminated.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

This proposed rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The costs to the board related to processing applications for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 will be recouped through fees paid by applicants. Applicants who apply for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 will be impacted by the \$40 initial application fee in § 39.72 and may incur expenses if they choose to demonstrate competency by completing 48 hours of continuing education, board approve examination or 120 clock hours in an approved program of study under § 39.11b. Applicants who choose to demonstrate competency through experience or provide written documentation showing at least 3 of 5 years

teaching long-term care subject matter will not have additional expenses for competency. While all applicants must complete child abuse recognition and reporting training, as required by 23 Pa.C.S. § 6383(b)(3)(i), there are free in-person and online child abuse recognition and reporting training options available. Therefore, the board does not anticipate a negative fiscal impact for this statutorily mandated training.

Sunset Date

The board continuously monitors the effectiveness of the board’s regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on March 18, 2026, the board submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the chairpersons of the Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee of the Senate and to the chairperson of the Professional Licensure Committee of the House of Representatives. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey comments, recommendations, or objections to the proposed rulemaking within 30 days of the close of the public comment period. The comments, recommendations or objections shall specify the regulatory review criteria in section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5b) which have not been met. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the rulemaking, by the board, the General Assembly and the Governor.

TITLE 49. PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

PART I. DEPARTMENT OF STATE

Subpart A. PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL AFFAIRS

**CHAPTER 39. STATE BOARD OF EXAMINERS OF NURSING HOME
ADMINISTRATORS**

GENERAL

§ 39.1. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

* * * * *

Individual study--A continuing education course which does not have an instructor or other interactive learning methodologies and which requires a passing grade on a written examination or workbook.

Jurisdiction—a state, territory or country.

License--Certification of an applicant who has met the requirements of the act and of this chapter that entitle the applicant to serve, act, practice and otherwise hold himself out as a licensed nursing home administrator.

* * * * *

§ 39.4. Admission to practice; temporary permits; provisional licenses.

Admission to the practice of nursing home administration in this Commonwealth will be granted by the Board as follows:

(1) By the issuance of a license by examination to an applicant who meets the requirements in section 6 of the act (63 P. S. § 1106) and in this chapter.

(2) By the issuance of a license by **[endorsement] reciprocity** to an applicant who has been licensed by examination in another state of the United States, if the applicant meets the requirements in section 10 of the act (63 P. S. § 1110) and of this chapter.

(3) By issuance of a temporary permit to an applicant who meets the requirements in section 14 of the act (63 P. S. § 1114) and in this chapter. The issuance of a temporary permit is subject to the following conditions:

* * * * *

(4) By the issuance of a license by endorsement or a provisional license to an applicant who meets the requirements in §§ 39.8a or 39.8b (relating to licensure by endorsement; and provisional endorsement license).

§ 39.8. Licensure by [endorsement] reciprocity.

(a) **[Application blanks for licensure by reciprocity shall be obtained by writing to the State Board of Examiners of Nursing Home Administrators, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Department of State, Post Office Box 2649, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania 17120. The required fee shall accompany the application in the form of a certified check or money order made payable to “Commonwealth of Pennsylvania N.H.A.”] An applicant for licensure by**

reciprocity shall submit an application in accordance with this chapter and in the manner and format prescribed by the Board.

(b) **[Two unmounted, finished passport size photographs, not proofs, 3 inches by 3 inches, facial features clear, of applicant shall be submitted with the application.] {Reserved}.**

(c) The Board may issue a license by **[endorsement] reciprocity** upon evidence that:

(1) The other state where the candidate is licensed maintained a system and standard of qualifications and examinations for nursing home administrators which were equivalent to those required in this Commonwealth at the time the other license was issued by the other state.

(2) The other state gives similar recognition and **[endorsement] reciprocity** to nursing home administrator licenses of the Commonwealth.

(d) The applicant shall present to the Board satisfactory evidence of having met the minimum requirements of the act regarding age, education, character, citizenship and experience.

(e) Applicants may be required to submit evidence of personal and professional standing from the appropriate State agencies, associations or the state board in the state in which they have been practicing or from another source.

(f) Applicants may be required to appear in person before a member of the Board for oral examination and interview before the granting of any license by **[endorsement] reciprocity**.

§ 39.8a. Licensure by endorsement.

(a) Requirements for issuance. To be issued a license by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 (relating to licensure by endorsement), an applicant shall satisfy all of the following conditions:

(1) Have a current license, certification, registration or permit in good standing to practice nursing home administration in another jurisdiction whose licensure standards are substantially equivalent to or exceed those established under sections 6 and 8 (a) of the act (63 P.S. § 1106 and 1108(a)) and §§ 39.5 and 39.7 (relating to requirements for admission to licensing examination; examination procedures; and subject matter for examinations). The following apply:

(i) An applicant shall submit a copy of the current applicable law, regulation or other rule governing licensure, certification, registration or permit requirements and scope of practice in the jurisdiction that issued the license, certificate, registration or permit.

(ii) If the applicable law, regulation or other rule is in a language other than English, at the applicant's expense, the applicable law, regulation or other rule shall be translated by a professional translation service and verified to be complete and accurate.

(iii) The copy of the applicable law, regulation or other rule must include the enactment date.

(2) Demonstrate competency by one of the following:

(i) Meet one or more of the standards for demonstrating continued competence of § 39.11b (relating to continued competence) during the 5 years immediately preceding the filing of the application, and verify, in a manner

and format approved by the board, to having read and understood the regulations of the Board, and the regulations of the Department of Health in 28 Pa. Code Part IV Subpart C (relating to long term care facilities).

(ii) Completion of 48 hours of continuing education that meets the requirements of § 39.61(a)-(c) (relating to requirements) during the 24 months immediately preceding the filing of the application, and verify, in a manner and format approved by the board, to having read and understood the regulations of the Board, and the regulations of the Department of Health in 28 Pa. Code Part IV Subpart C (relating to long term care facilities).

(3) Have not committed any act that constitutes grounds for refusal, suspension or revocation of a license, certification, registration or permit to practice nursing home administration under section 12(a) of the act (63 P.S. §§ 1112(a)) or § 39.9 (relating to revocation or suspension of licenses).

(4) Have not been disciplined by the jurisdiction that issued the license, certificate, registration or permit.

(5) Have paid the license application fee as required by § 39.72 (relating to fees).

(6) Have applied for licensure in accordance with this chapter in the manner and format prescribed by the Board.

(7) Have completed 3 hours of training in child abuse recognition and reporting from a provider approved by the Department of Human Services as required under 23 Pa.C.S. § 6383(b)(3)(i) (relating to education and training).

(b) Interview and additional information. An applicant may be required to appear before the Board for a personal interview and may be required to submit additional information,

including supporting documentation relating to competency and experience. The applicant may request an interview to be conducted by video teleconference for good cause shown.

(c) *Prohibited acts and discipline.* Notwithstanding subsections (a)(3) and (4), the Board may, in its discretion, determine that an act prohibited under section 12(a) of the act (63 P.S. §1112(a)) or § 39.9 or disciplinary action by another jurisdiction is not an impediment to the granting of a license by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111.

§ 39.8b. Provisional endorsement license.

(a) *Provisional endorsement license.* The Board may, in its discretion, issue a provisional endorsement license to an applicant while the applicant is satisfying remaining requirements for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 (relating to licensure by endorsement) and § 39.8a (relating to licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111).

(b) *Expiration of a provisional endorsement license.*

(1) An individual holding a provisional endorsement license may practice for up to 1 year after issuance of the provisional endorsement license. The Board, in its discretion, may determine that an expiration date of less than 1 year is appropriate.

(2) Upon a written request and a showing of good cause, the Board may grant an extension of no longer than 1 year from the expiration date of the provisional endorsement license.

(c) *Termination of a provisional endorsement license.* A provisional endorsement license terminates if any of the following occurs:

(1) When the Board completes its assessment of the applicant and denies or grants the license.

(2) When the holder of the provisional license fails to comply with the terms of the provisional endorsement license.

(3) When the provisional endorsement license expires.

(d) Reapplication. An individual may reapply for licensure by endorsement under § 39.8a after expiration or termination of a provisional endorsement license; however, the Board will not issue a subsequent provisional endorsement license.

STANDARDS OF PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE AND PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT

§ 39.92. Reporting of crimes and disciplinary actions.

(a) A licensee shall notify the Board of having been convicted of a felony, or having received probation without verdict, disposition in lieu of trial or an Accelerated Rehabilitative Disposition in the disposition of felony charges, within 30 days of the conviction or other disposition, or on the biennial renewal application, whichever is sooner. As used in this section, “convicted” includes a judgment, an admission of guilt or a plea of nolo contendere.

(b) A licensee shall notify the Board of disciplinary action in the nature of a final order taken against the licensee by the licensing authority of another [state, territory or country] **jurisdiction** within 90 days of receiving notice of the disciplinary action, or on the biennial renewal application, whichever is sooner.
